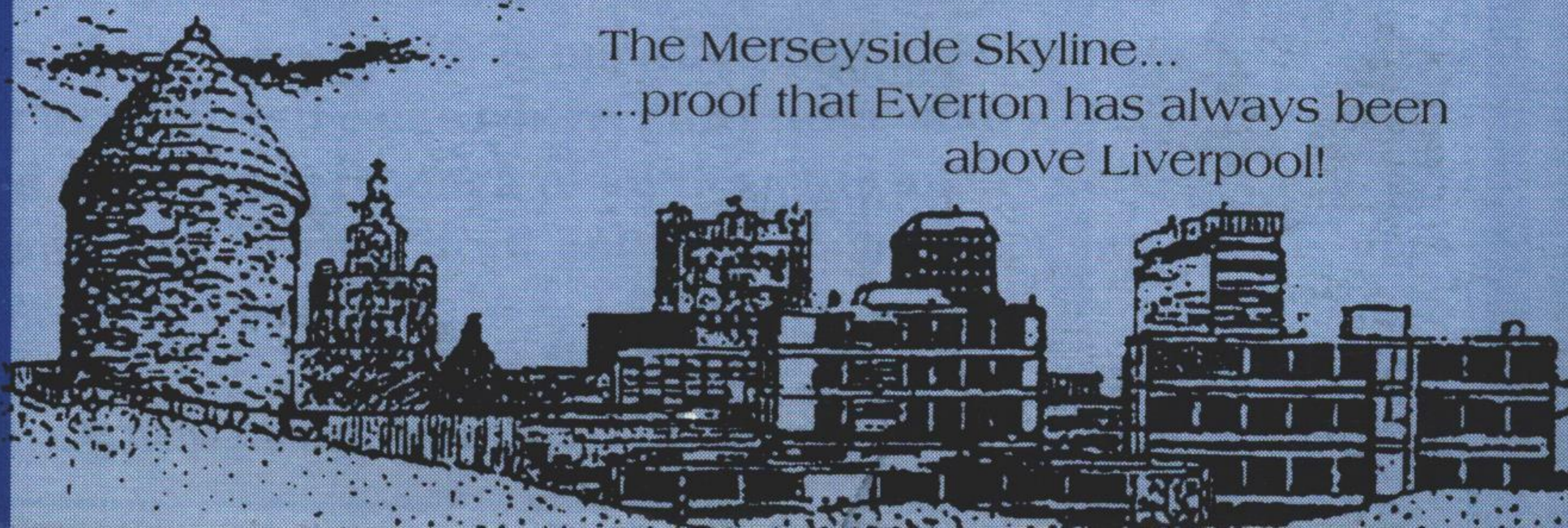

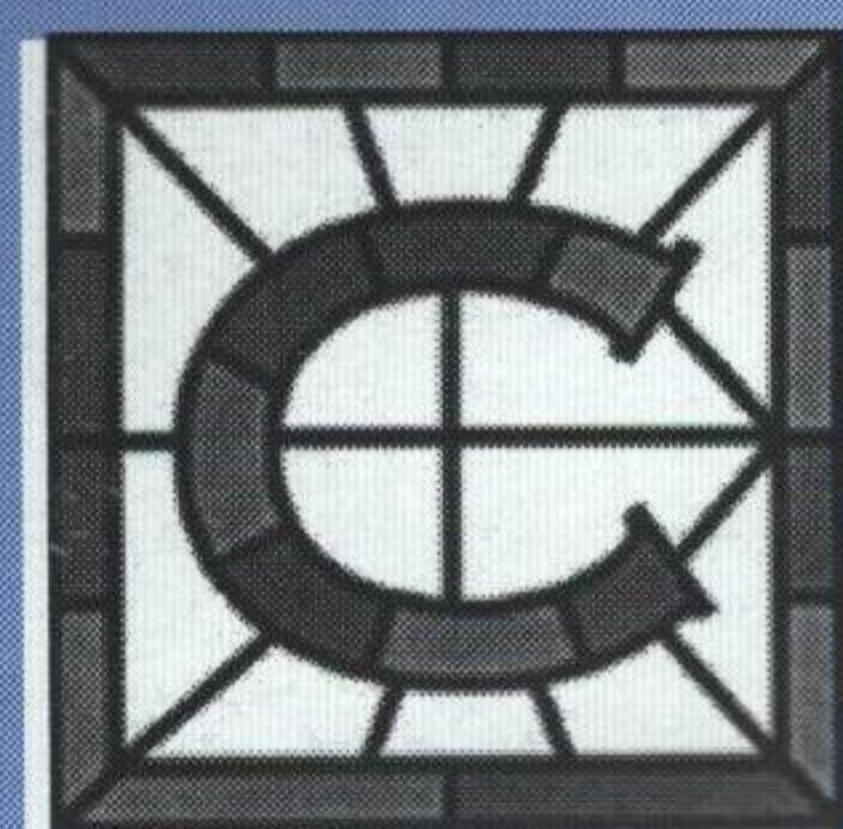
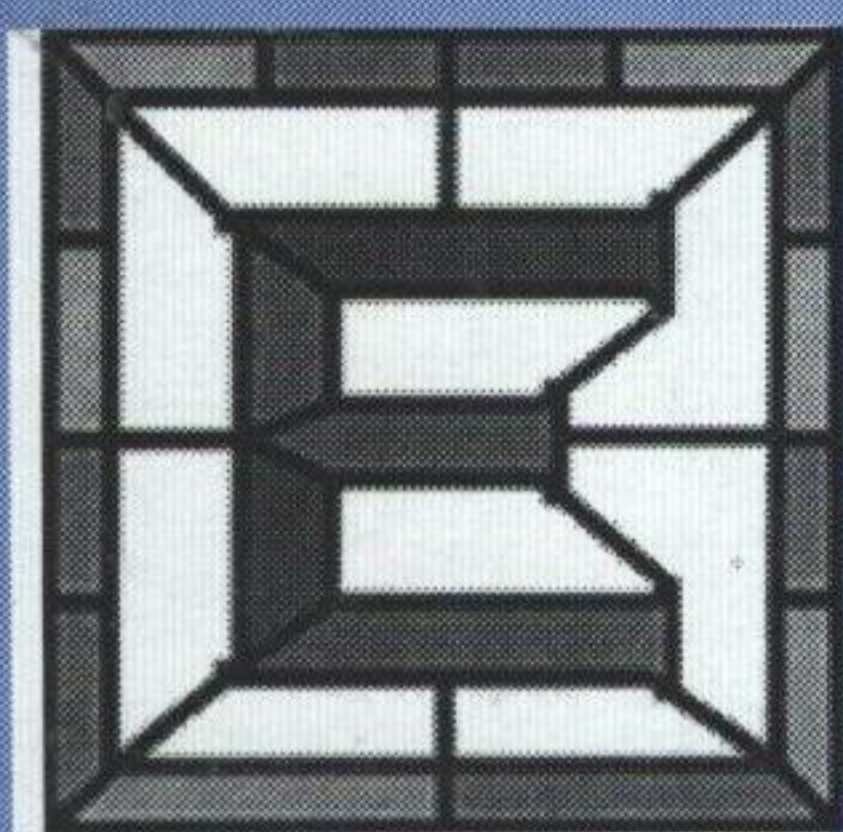


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# Editorial - Blue Blood

The AGM took place on Monday the 3rd December, items brought up included the way Walter goes about his team selection but Bill Kenwright used the old Boss support Boss ploy. Someone said that Walter & Archie were the Blues biggest assets. Quite a vote of confidence but nice to know that we the fans are no longer the clubs biggest assets.

The Kings Dock plan was also mentioned but that too was said to be well under way and that the board really couldn't say much more at this moment in time.

However it was announced that one of the world's biggest developers is to build the Kings Dock Stadium. Bovis Lend Lease who have built such great stadiums as the Sapporo Dome where England will play Argentina in next years World Cup. ( for more on the Kings Dock see page 25)

The Club debt had risen to £30 million but the sale of Ball & Jeffers had brought it down to under £20 million. Many fans were unhappy about the clubs image but at the end of the night not much had changed.

On the pitch, trying to find out who will be playing up front next is the new pre match game. Perm any 8 from 10 and the chances are you will still be wrong.

Walter seems to think that the draws at Bolton & Leicester plus the Chelsea home draw, playing with either one forward up or with a full back in the forward role were reasonable. I think that if we had played a more adventurous game we could easily have won all three of those games but then again that's what it's all about, different opinions.

All I know is that as an Evertonian I do not wish to see a full back at centre forward, especially when we have other forward players available.

The gates tell the tale, ok two of the last three home games have been live on T.V. but even so the attendance's have been poor and so has the football.

Like it or not we have slipped badly in the eyes of the neutral football fan and the opinion is that Everton live on T.V means, do the garden, decorate or catch up on some other work but certainly don't watch those bores.

It's hard to take all this because most fans want the opposite of what Walter gives us. Are we being unreasonable to want a right back to play at right back, because even when Smith moves Watson forward the vacant right back place is filled by the left back who is moved across, then the other left back, Naysmith is put as a left half come winger, whilst the man in that position Unsworth is moved to left back, enough of all this, it is totally annoying, not just watching it but having to type it all out to explain something that is unexplainable.

Paul Wharton an Evertonian got in touch with me and asked me "Did I know that next season 2001/02 would see Everton playing at the Top Level of English Football, for 100 Years".

If you deduct the four seasons we have been in the 2nd Division and take out the War years then Everton become the first Club to notch up a Century at the highest level

We will become the first English club to achieve this great feat, not Arsenal, not Man Untd, and certainly not the other lot.

What you may ask, are Everton planning to do about this Historical landmark? Well not a lot actually, early responses from Goodison seem very lacklustre and almost apathetic.

Here we have a club, millions of pounds in debt, struggling to make any kind of headway either on or off the pitch and what seems like an ideal opportunity to boost the coffers and moral at the same time is going begging.

Just think of the merchandise that could commemorate this feat, from the usual T-shirt to a special medal, that all fans could buy, ties, mugs. Early photos of Goodison, players like Fred Geary, the first real hero worshiped centre forward, on to Dean, Lawton, Young, Watson, oh sorry about that Walter, forget Watson but you know what I am getting at don't you?

Let's be proud of our club, can you imagine the hype if it was those done everything Man United fans, well they haven't done this!

It's up to all Blues to write to the media, phone the Radio Stations, 5 live, Talk Sport etc; spread the word.

Everton have always led the way in English football, we had the first all purpose built football stadium with four Double Decker stands. We were the first club to be presented with the Football League Trophy ( see this month's EFC History article) We were the first to bring out matchday cards the forerunner to the programme. There are many more things we were first at and I love everything about our history.

Don't listen to the Kopites when they try to decry it, they are jealous, they were a second rate team until the early 1960's and only became a good team in the 1970's. We had been a great team for many years before that, Dixie Dean's name makes them choke, they try and say Billy Liddell but no matter how good he was you have to remember he played almost 65% of his matches in the 2nd Division Dixie only played 1 season in the 2nd Division.

They didn't win the F.A.Cup until 1965 and then needed extra time, we had won it 59 years before that and had won it again before they spammed it.

Everton have always been associated with class football, the nickname the "School of Science" said everything, what was Liverpool's nickname in the 20's & 30's? No I don't know the answer either.

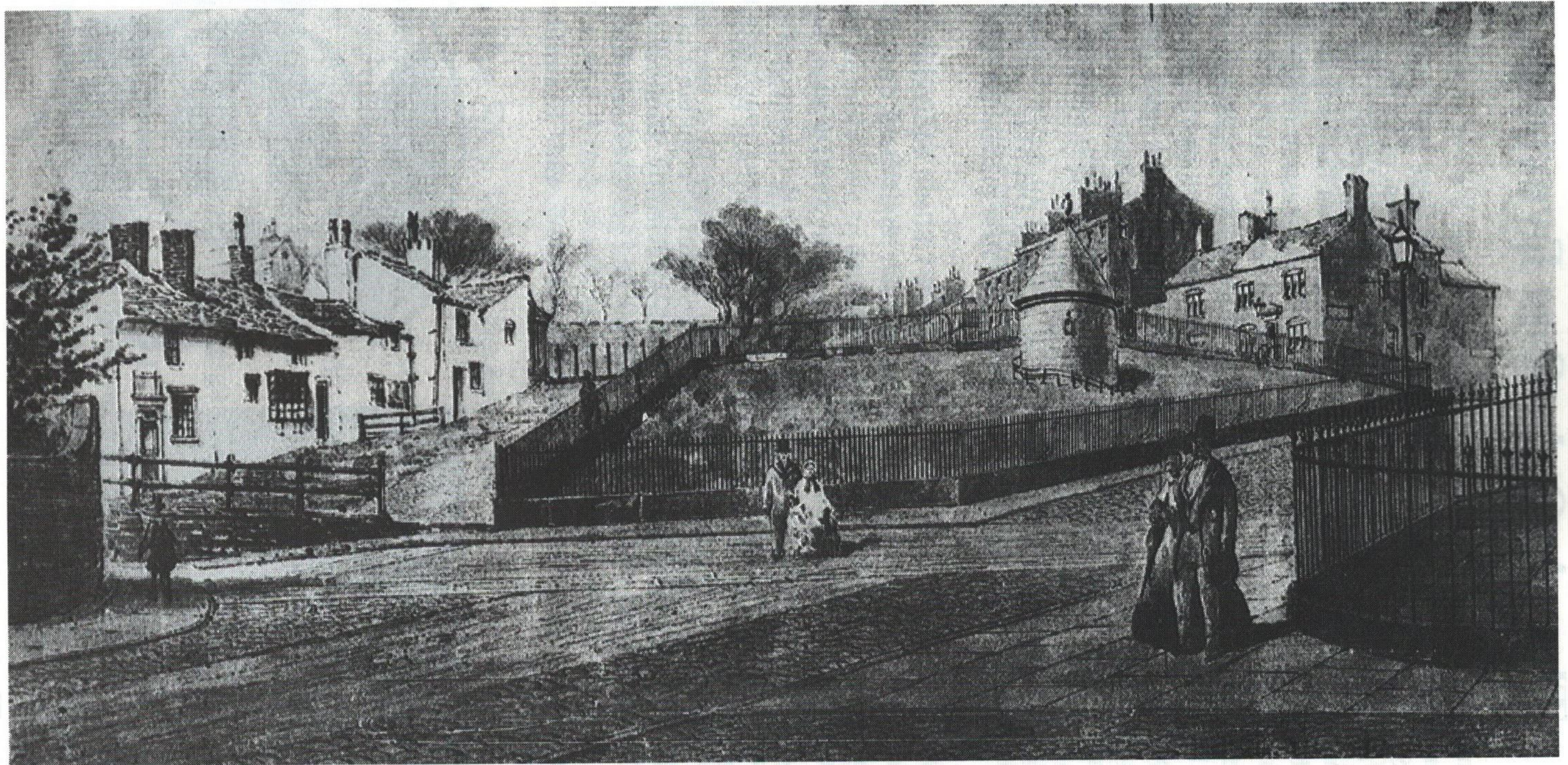
Everton are a special club, being at the very top of English Football for 100 Years is just another endorsement.

Whatever happens, something should be done, remember 1978 our centenary? No, neither do I because nothing was done.

# Everton 100 Years at The Top



**This is an artists impression of what it must have been like over 100 years ago in the district of Everton. Old Mother Noblett's Shop, the white house on the left, is the reason we are called The Toffee's. St Rupert's Tower which was incorporated into our club crest in 1938 is also in the scene.**

Most Evertonian's say "There's Only One Everton" but it's not strictly right. I was invited to a meeting at Goodison Park where fellow Blue Boys had gathered to hear a talk by John Shearon, about Corporacion Deportiva Everton, of Chile.

An article in an Everton programme from the 1976 season caught John's eye. It was about this other Everton in Chile and how they had just won the League. John was enthralled and has taken an active role in following the progression of our South American brothers.

The Ruleteros, as they are known, are based in Vina Del Mar, about 60 miles outside Santiago on the coast. They were founded on 24th June 1909 in Valparaiso, a port in Chile. Our Everton had been over to Argentina for a tour and some Anglo Chileans adopted the name. The club colours and the shape of the club badge.

From 1909 until the end of the 1930's Everton played in the local Leagues. The professional League started in 1933, mainly based in Santiago.

In 1942 Everton moved three miles up the coast to Vina Del Mar and in 1944 they joined the 1st Division. They became Champions, the first provincial team to achieve that feat.

They also have local rivals, Santiago Wanderers, the Chilean equivalent of Kopites. Everton's stadium holds 20,000 and has been used for the World Cup (1962) it was built in 1929 and is owned by the council, the Municipal.

They have one of the largest fan bases in Chile, even in the 2nd Division they attracted 12,000 gates. In 1976 they took over 50,000 supporters to the League Title Play Off Final in Santiago. That same year, 8,000 fans made the 13 hour coach trip to Temuco for a League game.

The feeling at the meeting was that it would be great for Evertonian's in England to try and get Everton in Chile to play us in a pre season friendly. Rumours are that we are going to California next pre season, why not try and get Everton Chile to play us out there.

Today when you travel to an away game you do so in relative luxury, some of you go by car, others by coach or train. There are those who fly to Luton and transfer onto the train or coach to London.

In the 50's there wasn't as many choices, there were mainly only two ways to get there. The first was by the train, the good old "Footy Special". Remember that in those days the trains were still steam and the rolling stock could be ancient. Separate compartments with seating for six, no corridors, no loos, no food or drink served. As I said they were very old, in fact the graffiti was in Latin, they could also be freezing.

Later models had carriages that led to corridors and you could walk about, go to the toilet, or hang your head out of the window and get covered in smoke, ending up looking like an extra from the Black & White Minstrel Show.

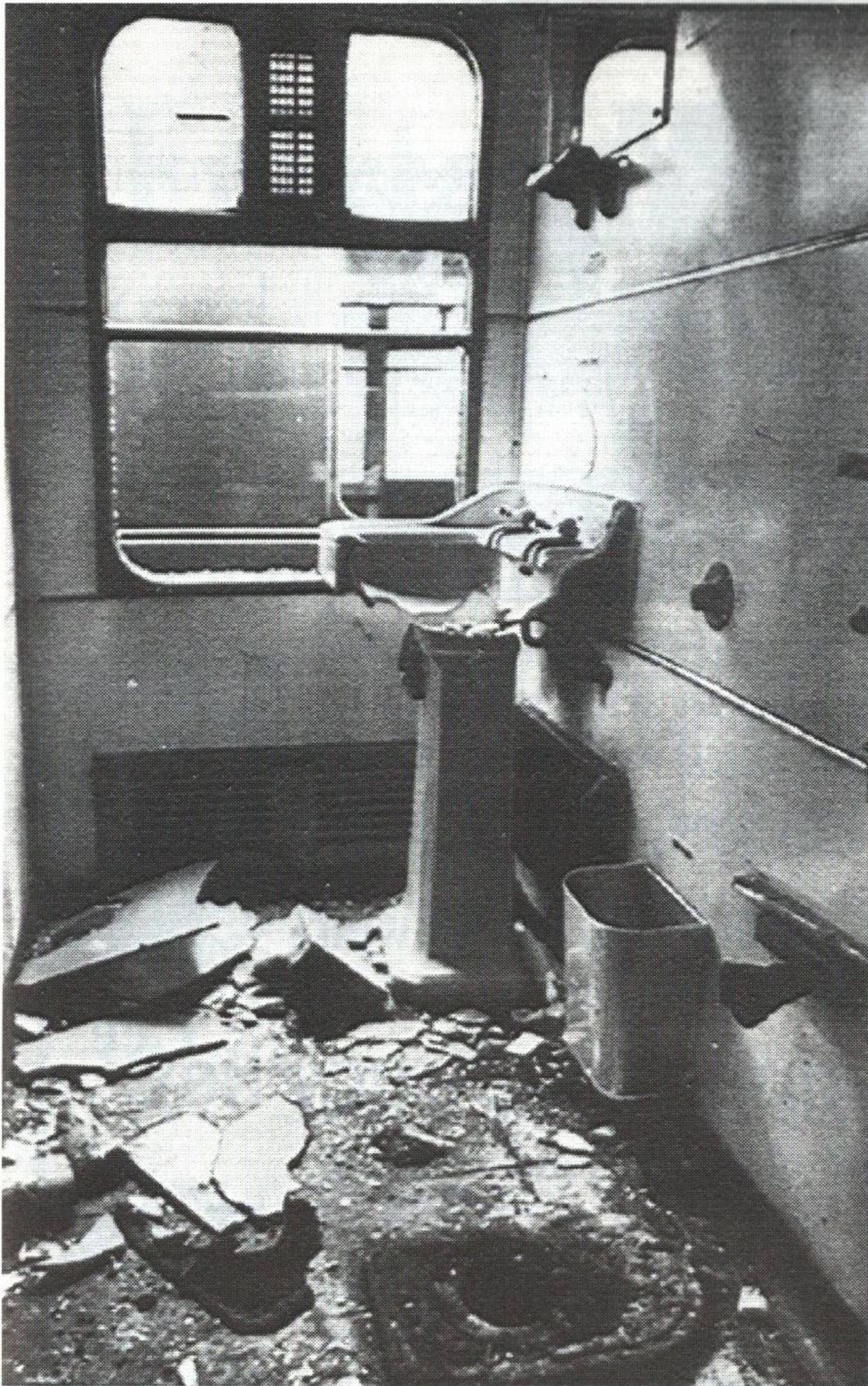
The trips sometimes turned into nightmares, idiots thought it hilarious to smash the toilets and wash basins to pieces, never mind any poor sod who wanted to use them. The communication cord got pulled more times on a Saturday than the best looking bird at the Grafton.

Life on the coach wasn't much better, for London games you had to leave at 11.30pm on the Friday night, from outside St John's Gardens in the City Centre. Crown Coaches, Lawrensons, Sunniways, Home James, Toppings and others led a convoy onto the M6 but only until you got to Birmingham, there was no M1 in those days so it was onto the A5 for a slow and laborious, journey, no toilets on these coaches and if the driver was a Kopite and many were, you had to sit crossed legged for hours, arriving in the Smoke at 6am where only the early morning workers were to be seen.

Towards the end of the 60's coach travel grew worse, apart from all the other hazards the fans whose fine city you were visiting decided to give you a warm welcome. They would find some lovely little spot and throw bricks at your coach, apart from the flying glass you would lose your deposit. This was a sum of money above and beyond the price of travel that you had to pay, if the coach came back undamaged you got your money back.

The Motorways had sprung up around the country and the great British Businessman decided in his wisdom to help lighten the load of the weary traveller, by charging the earth for a sausage roll or pie. The Football coaches would descend on the Motorway cafes and it was like the Viking's revisited, only this time the stuff that was pillaged was food. After a short time the service stations banned all football supporters but at least there was a toilet on the modern coaches so things were not as bad as they could have been.

So remember the next away game you go to in your lovely air conditioned car or coach, think of all the Blue Boys who went before you and who even in the heat of the summer, took an overcoat with them to away games, not to wear but to drape over the smashed window to keep the draught out.

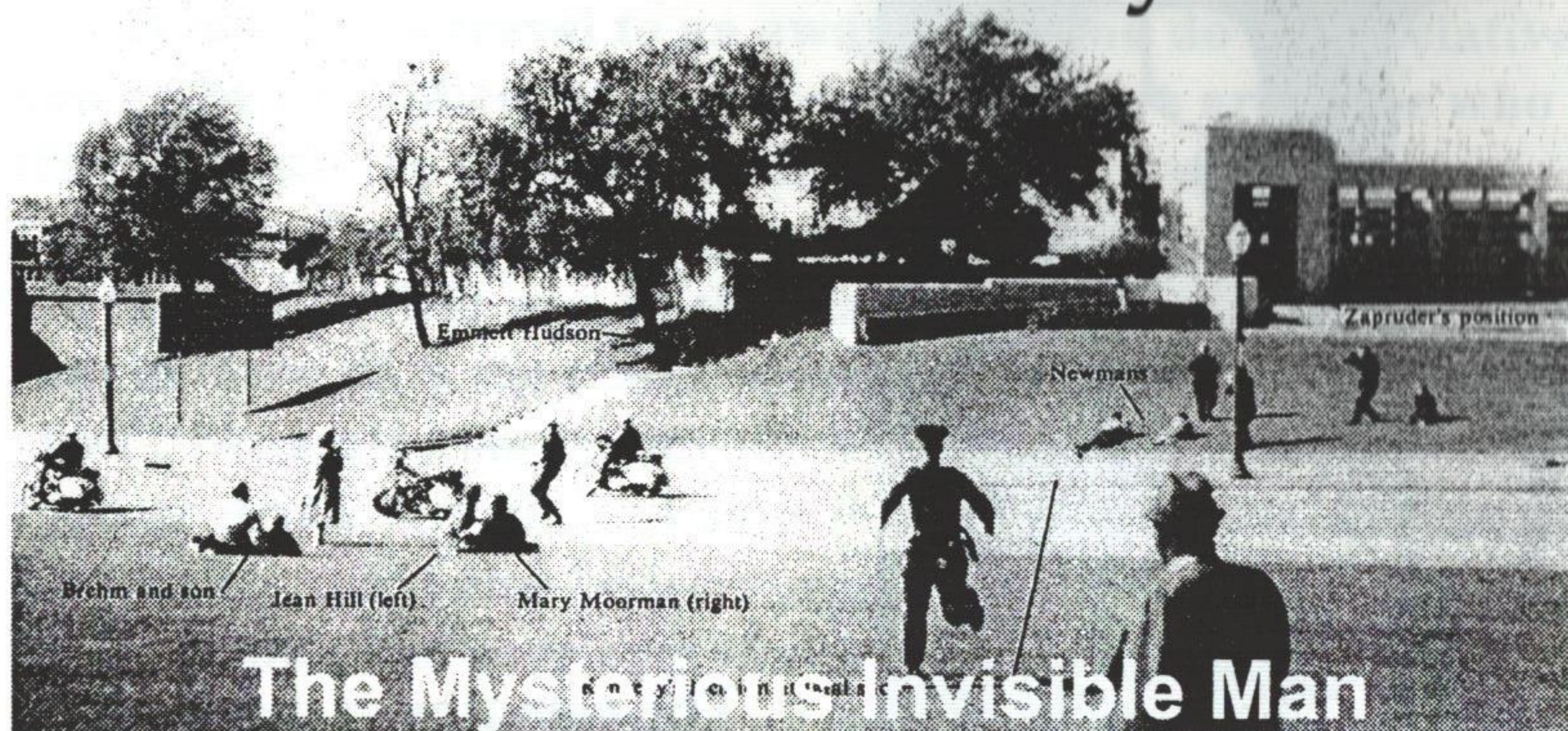

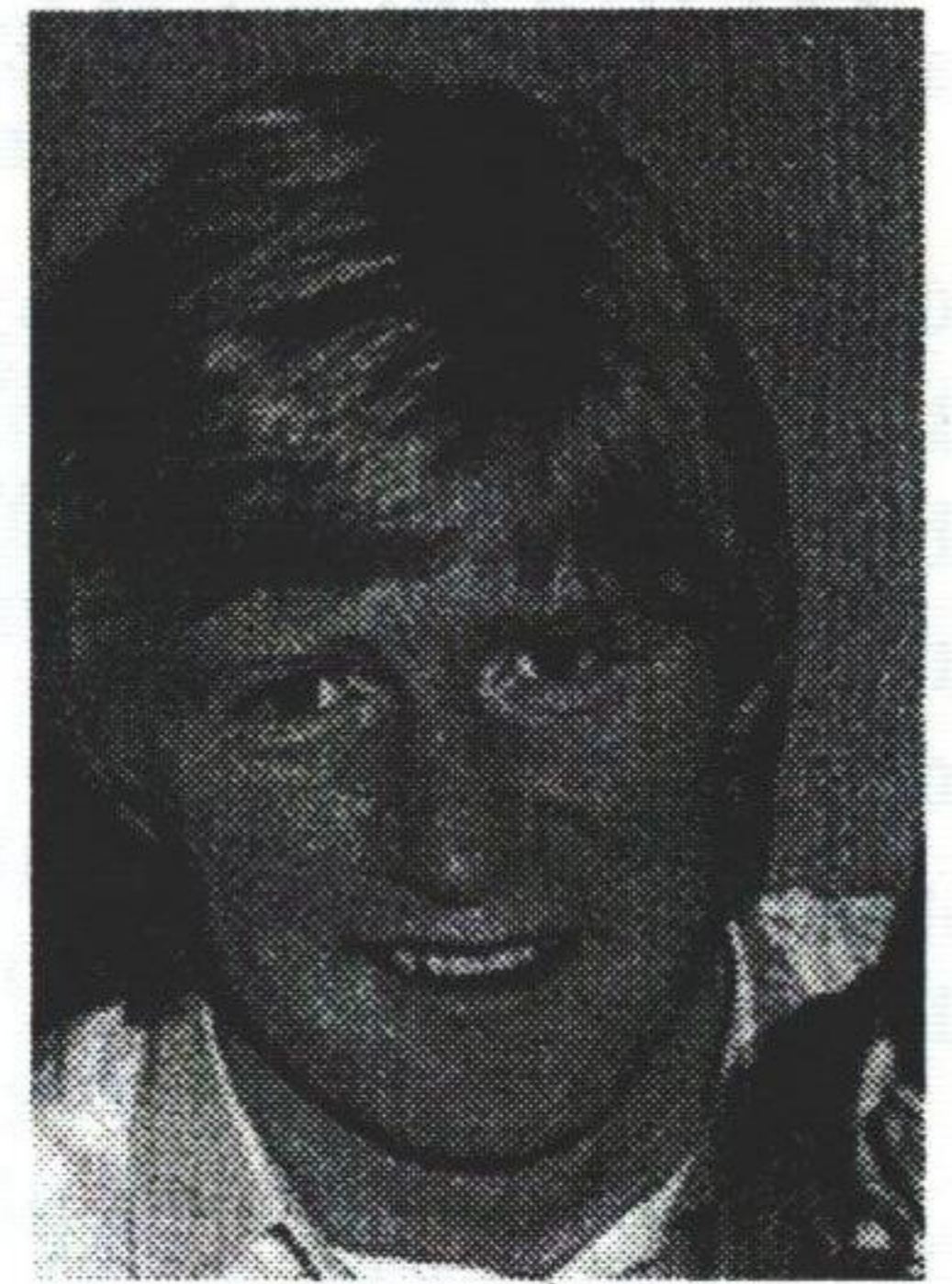

Middlesboro at home, only 15,807 attend, at least they saw us score two goals, as we win 2-0 thanks to

Higgins and Sharp. We get a good draw at Maine Road against Man City, with Adrian Heath scoring our goal.

Alan Biley is about to leave and John Barton goes to Derby, neither player had set our hearts on fire but again to be fair to Barton he had a terrible time with injuries.

The Red Plague at home and they get another spammy win, Sharp gets our only goal, I am not going to mention their players names lets just say it was a sad night on the ale after this match.

Nottingham Forest away, we don't get many points at this place but Steve Mc Mahon gets a goal and we win 1-0, an excellent result for the Blues. Three days later and down to Birmingham for another great win, 2-0 with goals for Alan Ainscow and Adrian Heath.

Manchester United at home and a brilliant game, it's end to end stuff as Everton hang on for a point in a breathtaking 3-3 draw. Lyons, Heath and Sharp pull us back into the match after going behind three times.

We are still in 11th place and a trip to Coventry has the Blues looking good for at least a point, yes we fall down that hole again, losing 1-0, we are back in inconsistency mode.

A defeat up at Sunderland puts us into unlucky 13th place, things are looking bad, we need to get a grip and do it soon.

Only 15,460 pay to come to the next home match, against Forest. Graeme Sharp gets two goals and we register a win.

Arsenal at Goodison and again we win, I can't believe it, Heath and Billy Wright work the miracle, in a great game.

Mickey Walsh got a game in the Arsenal match, playing at left back, he did fairly well. May 1st and the long and frightening trip to Swansea, why do the Welsh clubs treat these games as Wales v England ..when the majority of Everton fans don't give a toss about our National team and only have eyes for the Blue Boys. Anyway we give them a hiding, we turn on the style and win 3-1 Sharp gets two goals and Heath the other. Stuart Rimmer makes his debut for Everton.

Rimmer plays in the next match at home to Leeds, Sharp does the business and we win again.

The season is drawing to a close, only two games left one at home and it's against Wolves, Eastoe scores but the match ends 1-1 and the 20,124 crowd drift away not knowing if the future is bright or bleak.

There had been so many changes that Steve Mc Mahon with thirty one games was the most regular player, we had used no less than twenty seven different players in League matches alone. An amazing amount, it's no wonder the team was finding it hard to be consistent.

We finished in 8th place, very good considering all the problems and changes, maybe next season we will put it all together and win something.



The Pre Season saw Everton in a new strip, a "V" neck with a white trim, a very nice kit actually.

Kendall once again had a full programme of friendlies arranged, from July 31st to August 1st Everton ..were in Brugge for a tournament, we lost to Lockeren 4-3 but beat Genoa 2-1 for third place. We then played Rhyl away on the 9th August, followed by Plymouth away 4-2 for us, goals from Johnson 2, Sheedy and Sharp. Bournemouth away ended 4-3 for the Blues, Sheedy, Heath and two from Sharp. Then on 20th August at Wigan the boys slammed six into the net, Andy King got two, Sharp, Irvine, Sheedy and Heath finish the job and we win 6-1. The friendlies end on the 24th August at Northwich Victoria.

There had been more changes to the squad and it was sad to see Mick Lyons leave the club, a Blue Boy through and through. Joe Mc Bride went to Bolton and Eastoe also left. The "New" players were Andy King and David Johnson, well not so much new as returned. We also have Kevin Sheedy a "Red" that has seen the light.

Everton announce that all night games will revert to a 7.30pm kick off, as a survey showed that most fans found it difficult getting home after a 7.45pm start.

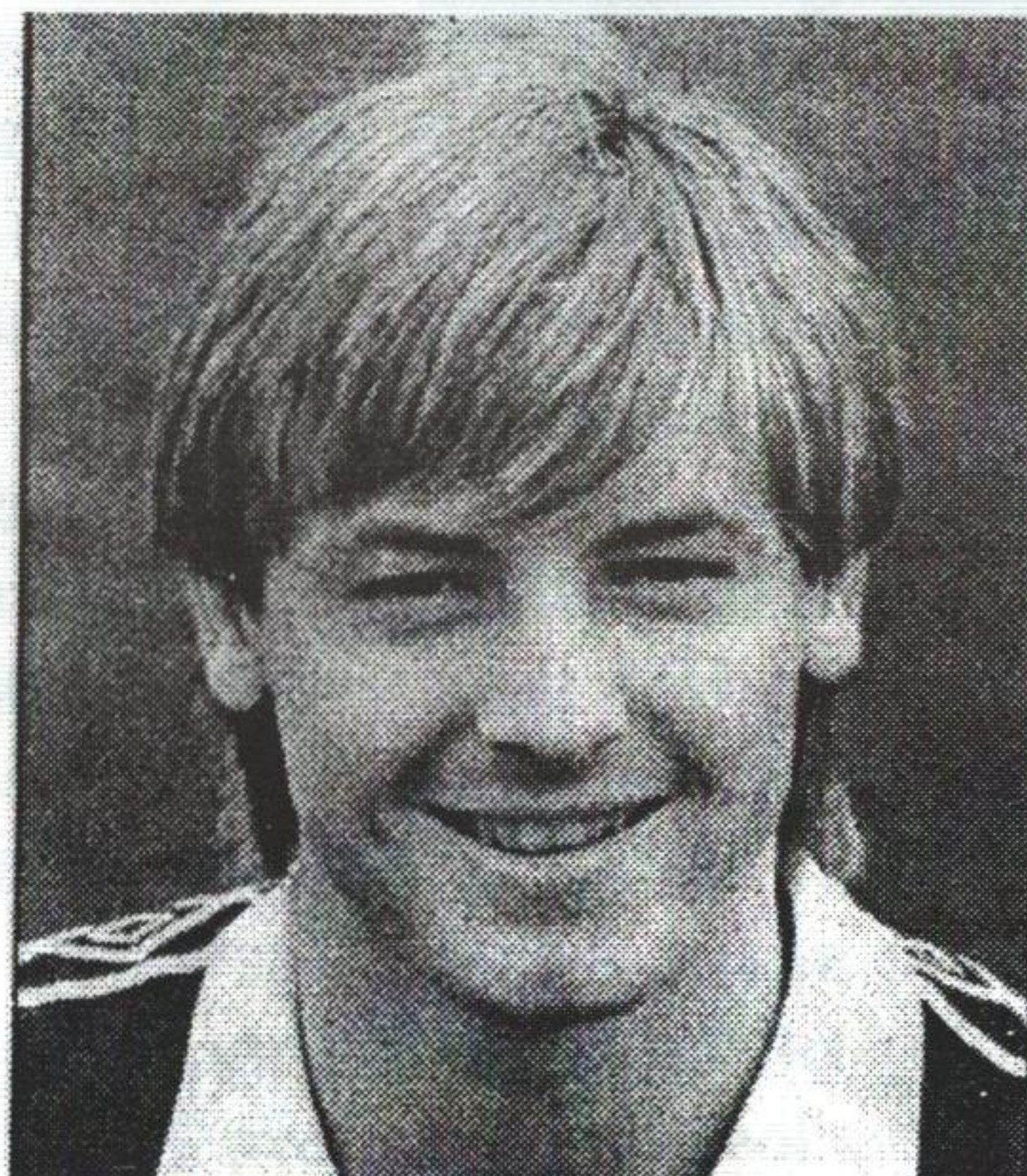
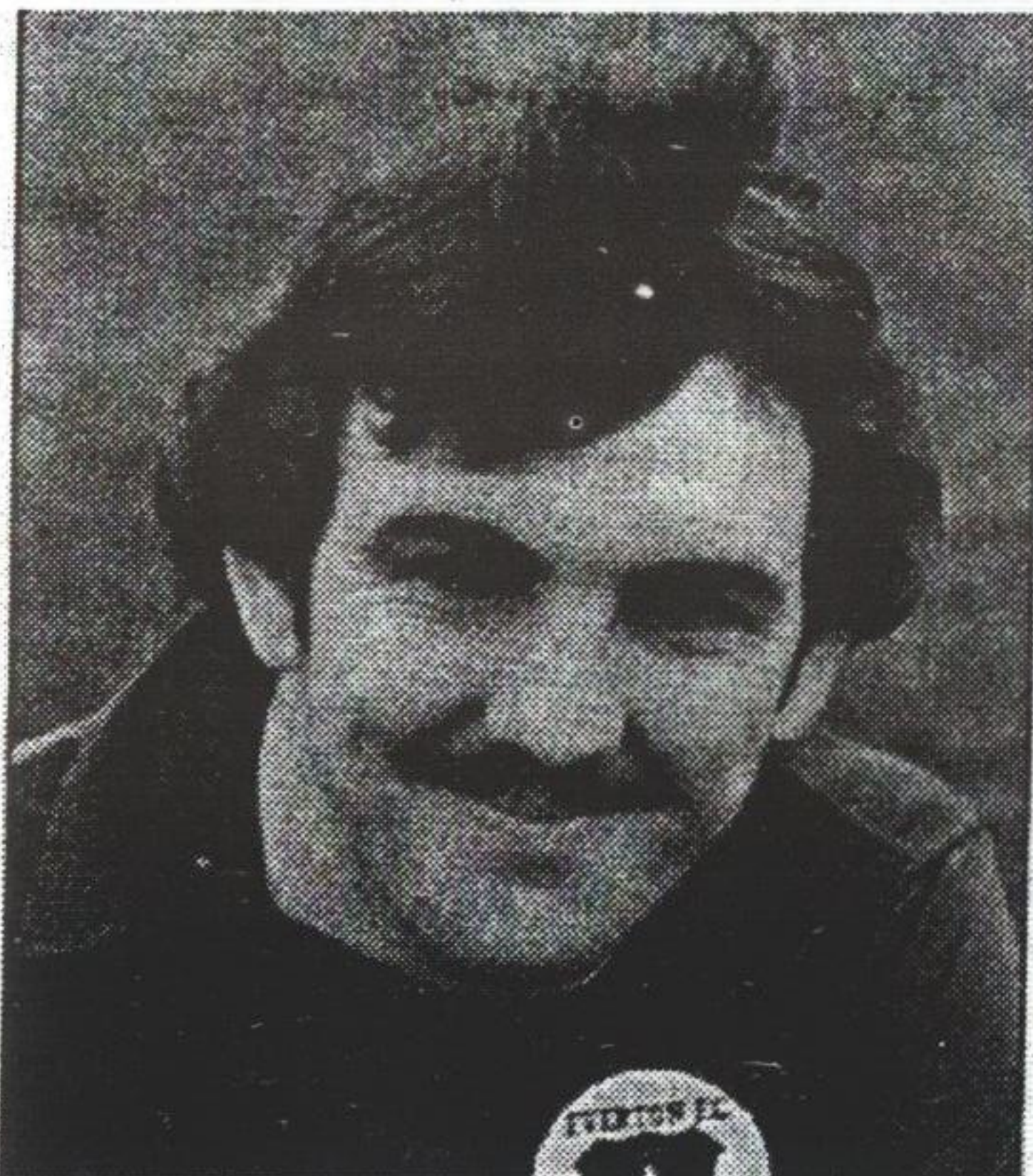
The League started with an away game against newly promoted Watford, Elton John's lads were in the First Division for the first time in their history and they got off to a flying start, they beat us 2-0. Not the best of starts to the new campaign but three night later at Goodison, the floodlights come on, the Boys run out, the Street End roars and we smack the European Champions 5-0, yes the Blues that we love rip them apart. Adrian Heath gets two, Graeme Sharp gets two, Andy King gets the other one. Everybody is made up, we clap them off the pitch until our hands are sore.

Spurs at home and over 30,000 turn up to watch another fine display, this time the score is 3-1 and Steve Mc Mahon, Kevin Sheedy and Billy Wright all score. Mark Higgins makes his 100th appearance in the Royal Blue Shirt.

Over to Old Trafford and a disappointing defeat, we go down 2-1. From what was one of the best grounds in the League we go to one of the worst, little Notts County, I mean to say, how the hell did they manage to get into the First Division ? Only 9,197 are there to watch, they get a penalty, they score, we lose, know the feeling ? so do I, it's

called being a Blue.

Norwich at home and Alan Irvine, just back from injury gets us a point in a 1-1 draw. Coventry away and again only 9,319 turn up, a few seasons ago Everton would have took that many themselves to a game like this. Heath and King score but we lose again this time 4-

Brighton at home and I feel embarrassed, only 17,539 are here, are we the new Coventry? are we going down the same path as Notts County? things are beginning to look very bleak. We still can't win, we can only manage a 2-2 draw, Billy Wright and Adrian Heath save our face.

More sad trips are in line as we get Newport in the League Cup, another sad bloody ground, at least we win and send the small band of loyal Blues home happy.

Back to the big games and Man City at home sees a poor but welcome 25,158 fans inside Goodison Park, they see the boys win in a close 2-1 game.

Another trip to South Wales, this time to Swansea, we win again this time the score is 3-0 Steve Mc Mahon and Kevin Richardson score, the other was an own goal, donated by those nice friendly Swansea lads. We follow that win with another at Goodison against Sunderland, the score is 3-1 and has the pride of place on our brand new scoreboard, used for the first time today, it was sponsored by "Bulova" and replaced the old one that had been there since 1971.

The 2nd Leg of the League Cup at home to Newport and a dedicated crowd of 8,941 watch as we hold them to a draw!! David Johnson and Andy King get our goals.

Back in the League and the long trip to Southampton doesn't bring any reward, we get beat 3-2.

The "Derby" at home, we sign Glen Keeley on loan from Blackburn, he is thrown into

the "White Hot" atmosphere of the Derby, he loses his head and tries to tackle Kenny Dog-lead, now if Keeley had known what every Blue Boy knows, he would not have gone anywhere near a man who has legs that collapse like a Blackpool deckchair. He gets sent off, we get murdered, this is the worst day of my life. I am glad I am on the dole, at least I do not have to face up to those smarmy Red sods on Monday. This defeat has started the fans off, they are calling for heads and Kendall acts quickly to appease them. Keeley is sent back to the void that is Blackburn, Borrows is dropped, Southall is left out, it was said because of injury but no one knows for sure.

Jim Arnold is in goal for the match with Arsenal in the League Cup, we get a 1-1 draw, which is a good result considering everything that has happened.

Arsenal away again, only four days later, we do the same again and get a 1-1 draw.

To sum up how bad things were, Everton flew out to Malta, we play one of their local sides in a friendly, it ends 0-0. I don't think I need add much.

The 0-0 scoreline haunts us again, we only draw with West Brom at home.

Arsenal away in the replay of the League Cup, we get slammed 3-0 and go out, three days later still in London we lose to West Ham 2-0 Alan Irvine gets sent off.



Into December and Birmingham at home sees a new post war low attendance figure of only 13,707, their reward is a boring 0-0 draw. Terry Curran made his debut on loan from Sheff Untd

Ipswich away and I've heard a few reason for players being dropped but when Kendall said that he was not playing Billy Wright because he was "Overweight" it was the first time I have heard a manager say someone is fat. and until he loses weight he will not play again for the first team. All very well Howard but did he just put on weight overnight or had no one noticed? It didn't do us any harm, as we won 2-0 with goals from Richardson and Sheedy.

Luton at home and we win in fine style, a great 5-0 victory helps to lift the gloom, Heath with two and Bailey, Curran and Sheedy give us all a very nice Christmas present. The 27th December and another

away game for all the weary Blues, not too bad only down the road to Stoke, George Berry their big bustling centre half who hates Everton players gets sent off but we still lose 1-0. The last game in 1982 and it is a special one, not only do we win against Forest at Goodison 3-1, but also the debut of Peter Reid, yes Kendall had bought a good player and heran out wearing the number ten shirt. Sharp got two goals and Mc Mahon the other.

New Years Day and an away game at West Brom, Coachloads of Paracetamol specials take the hungover Evertonians to the game, they see an exciting 2-2 draw thanks to goals from Higgins and Sharp. We have been on a bit of a run but it all comes tumbling down at White Hart Lane, we lose 2-1.

The F. A. Cup sends us back down to South Wales to play Newport again, we get a 1-1 draw and bring them back to Goodison Park.

We know the replay will be tough, they played well at Goodison in the League Cup and we are glad when the final whistle goes. We manage to win 2-1 thanks to King and Sharp.

Things are starting to get sorted out, there has been a lot of team changes, Sharp and Heath have both been left out at times and so have King, Richardson and Southall. We beat Watford at home 1-0 David Johnson scored and then we won again away at Norwich, again only 1-0 but a vital win all the same.

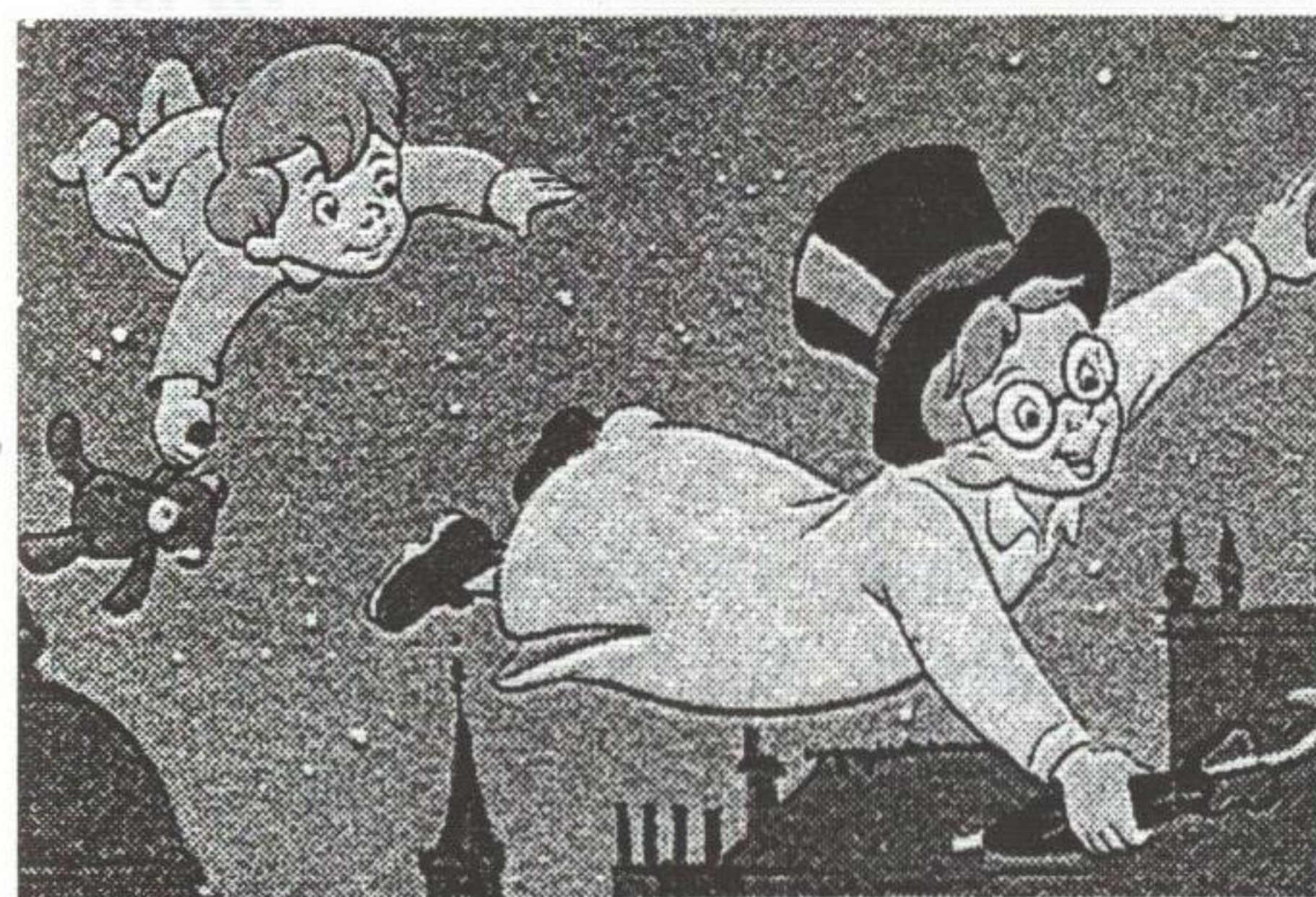
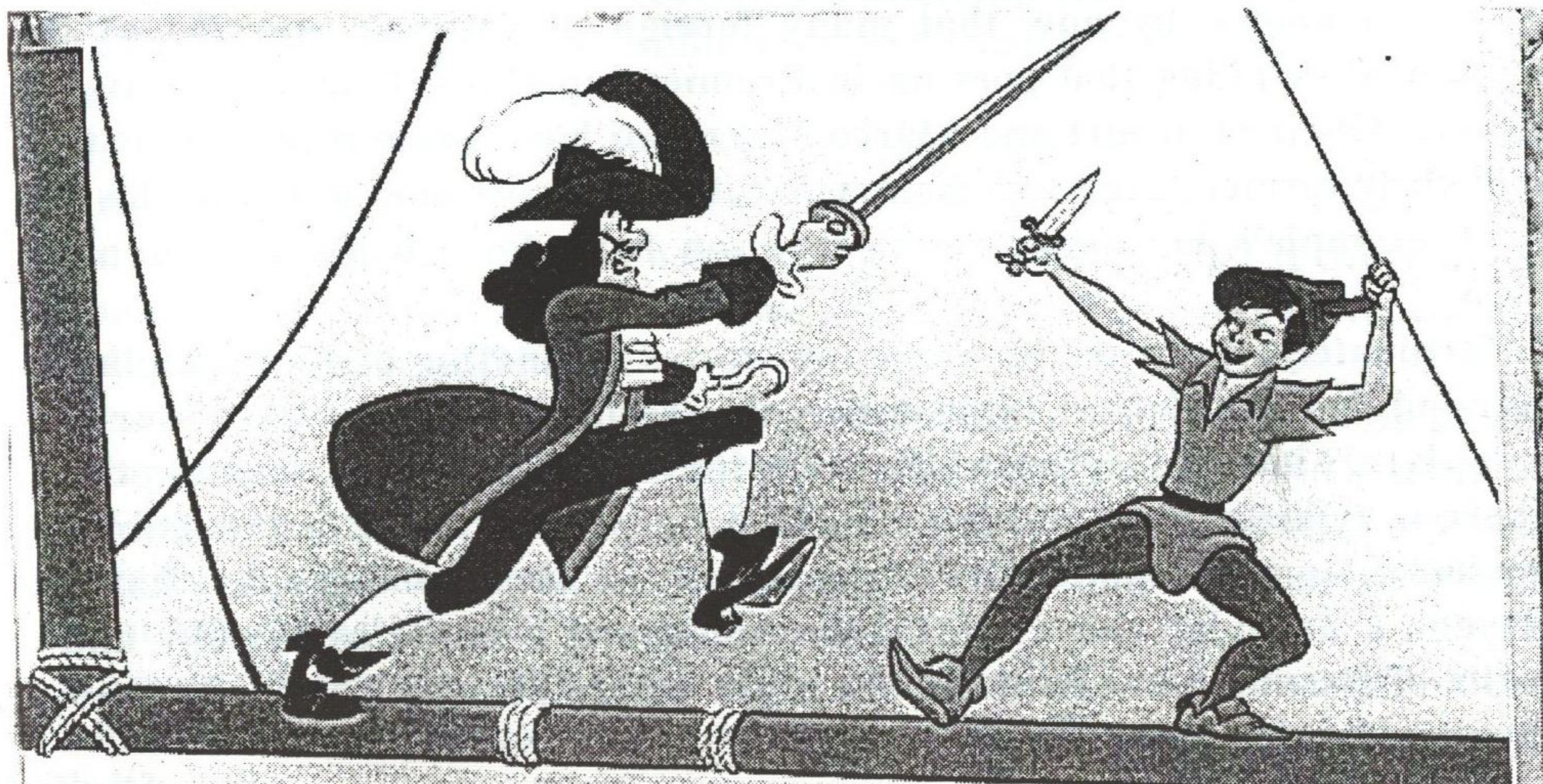

# The Demon Drink

I wonder how many supporters feel that they are being cheated when watching Everton? Not because of the lack of effort or ability on the part of the players (as if!) or any tactical lack on Walter's part (perish the thought) we are being cheated because the players do not prepare themselves properly as professional athletes. Nor is this confined to Everton – it is a fault that is true of most British clubs. The fault is of course the drink culture that exists in Britain.

It is well known by now that many foreign players are shocked at the amount of drinking that goes on in Premiership clubs. Our own erstwhile players, Olivier Dacourt and Marco Mazzerati have made it plain that they hold their former teammates' dietary habits in low esteem, added to this are other examples too numerous to mention from foreign players for other clubs.

Unfortunately, there are all too many stories emanating of Everton players over-indulging in alcohol, often during the season. More than one of our current players have fallen foul of the law with respect to alcohol consumption. There is evidence that a drink culture is deeply ingrained in the club. Dai Davies, the goalie from the 1970's mentions in his autobiography that two players, a defender and a midfielder, consumed a bottle of Whisky and a bottle of Brandy between them, the night before playing Newcastle United, Everton lost that game 5-0.

## Two Hours a Day Training

I am not suggesting we are unique here, other clubs may be as bad or worse. The names of Paul Merson, Tony Adams, George Best, Jimmy Greaves and our own Gazza are familiar as victims of alcoholism and added to these must be many others of less fame but equal misery.

It is an accepted fact that excess consumption of alcohol has an adverse effect on an individual's health, in the case of professional sportsmen, who, presumably receive dietary advice from an early age, such consumption can only be regarded as a means of career suicide. Why do they do it? One answer must be that these young men have too much leisure time on their hands (Materazzi mentioned that barely 2 hours training a day was the norm at Everton) as well as, of course, enormous amounts of money. Another factor is the ingrained culture of drinking – it has been alleged recently that on well known current Premiership manager at another club encouraged team drinking sessions in a bid to instil collective spirit into his team.

Surely there is a responsibility here on the Club to help Page 23 younger players?

If afternoons are free, isn't there a duty on the Clubs to use that time to prepare the young lads for a future outside football, which will arrive for virtually all of them, whether it is when they are 19 or when they are 37?

And should the players not see for themselves the harm they are doing to their careers?

Look at it like this – a player who cares for himself properly, may be adding 2– 3 seasons to his career. At current Premiership wages, that could be anything from £1.5 million to £3 million – surely worth making a few sacrifices to achieve.

Some may say that they are only young lads, entitled to enjoy themselves, and as long as they do their drinking “at the right time” I.e. 4-5 days before a match(!) there is no harm in a few drinks. I would say that if these people are paid the equivalent of a win on the lottery for 1-2 seasons work, they are duty-bound to make sacrifices.

Some continental clubs recognise that there is no “right time” for alcohol consumption and prohibit their players from drinking during the season.

Some Premiership managers – John Gregory of Villa, ex Chelsea boss Vialli, Wenger of Arsenal and our friend Monsieur Houllier from across the park, have acted against alcohol consumption.

Is it a coincidence that ALL these clubs have scored late goals against Everton in the last year or so, or has better conditioning had something to do with it?

Alcohol consumption, it is said, slows the body's recovery from injuries. Think of some of our more injury prone players and ask yourself if the ones who seem to be out injured time and time again are likely to be teetotallers.

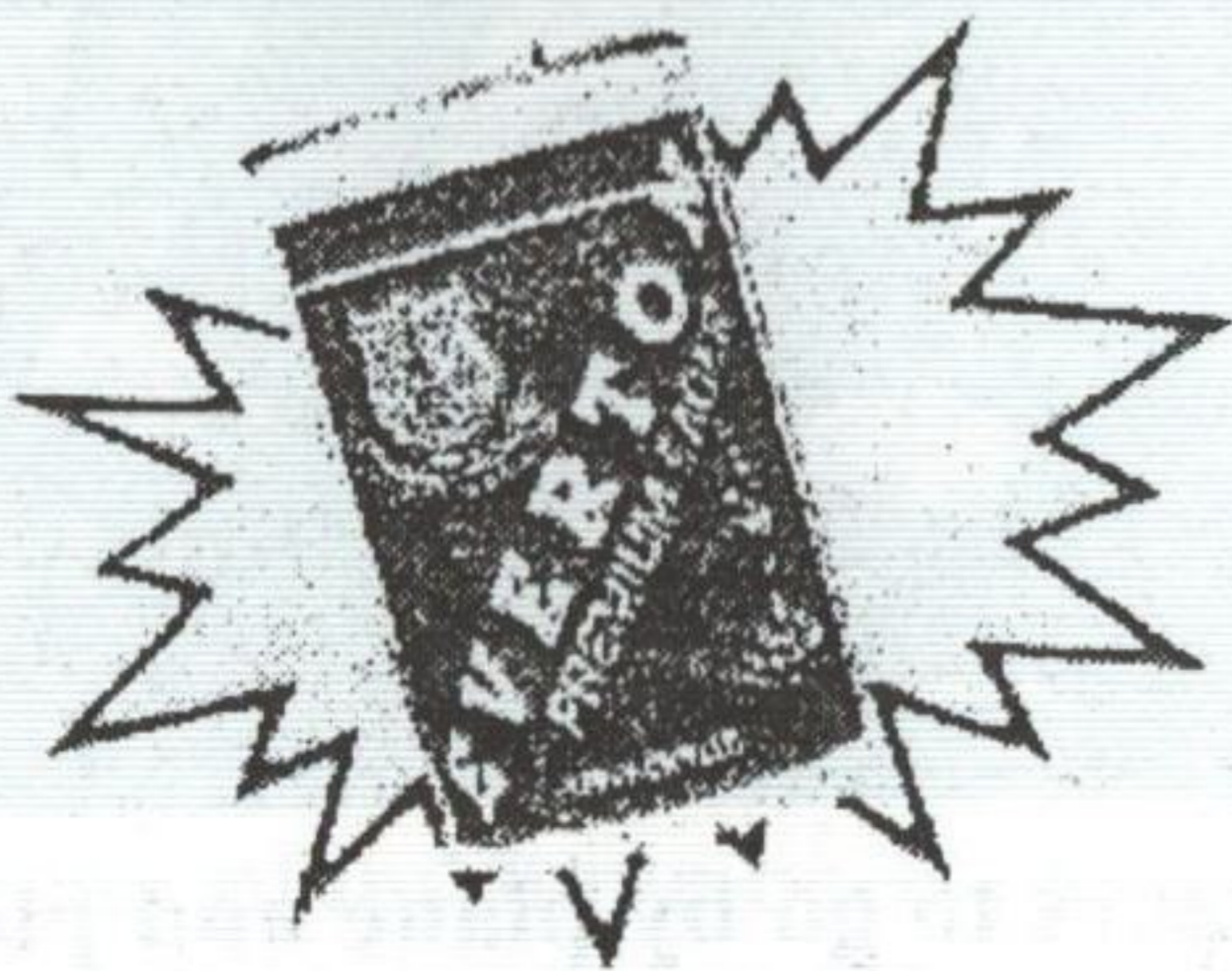

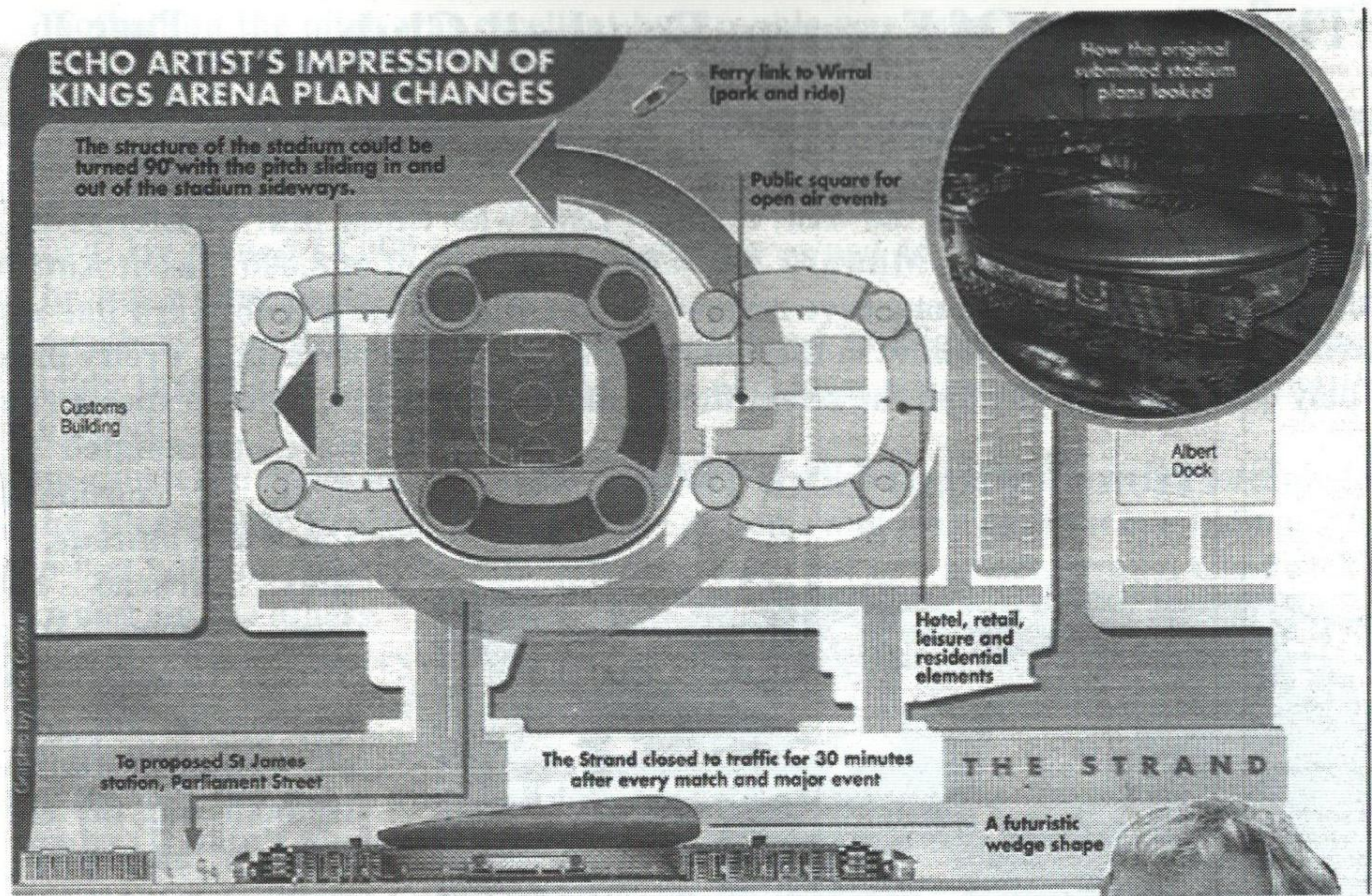
## In The News

Above is an article from the Liverpool Echo, printed on Wednesday 5th December 2001, just two days after the AGM.

You must wonder why this was not announced at the AGM but still here is the gist of the story.

**The proposals.**

The Strand Road, which is the main one leading to the Albert Dock / Kings Dock will be closed for 30 minutes after every home game, allowing the fans to disperse.

A pitch that will slide in and out of the stadium sideways instead of at one end.

Turning the arena around, so one of its goals backs onto the river (stewards will be taught to swim—no just joking on the swimming bit)

A futuristic wedge shape to the arena, tapering down from a high stand to a low one at the retractable pitch side of the structure.

A new open public square sheltered from the elements by the structures all around it, to create a venue for the kind of open air events the Kings Dock site currently runs.

The arena will now sit at the Customs House end of the Kings Dock, with all the other amenities towards the Albert Dock.

The new site gives access to an old railway station that was last used in 1916 but will be reopened for matches.

Tram links, park and ride areas in Wirral

If everything goes according to plan, building could start within one year, with a target of completion for the start of the 2005/06 season.

The arena plans have been changed to try and ward off any objections and look far more sensible as the stadium will not now block residents view of the river and the Albert Dock shopping complex will have more people in the immediate area.

Our third season in the League was to prove the old saying "Third time lucky".

Before the season started Everton went to Stony Lane where they beat Chester 11-0. Beating Wolves 5-0 (Geary 2, Milward 2, Chadwick 1) in front of 8,000 fans at Anfield on the 13th September 1890 saw rave reviews for the Blue Boys. The forward line was described as the smartest quintet in the country and trained to perfection. Pretty passing play of Latta & Brady and the scientific calculations of Geary, whose express runs

were terminated by shots of considered speed and altitude.

Alex Lohead had been signed from Third Lanark he only played one game all season. Andrew Hannah was the club Captain and was a brilliant full back, he was also something of a lively lad. He once went into a lions gage for a bet!

His partner at full back Dan Doyle was also a great player, Everton were lucky to have such quality defenders.

A week after beating Wolves Everton travelled to Pikes Lane, Bolton for a 3.45pm kick off. 12,000 fans turn up to watch an-

other fine exhibition of football by the Salmon & Blues, as EFC were called that season, because of their shirts. (see photo on page 30) the scoreline was the same as the previous week, another 5-0 win Geary & Milward again got 2 each with Latta getting the other goal.

Away again the following week, this time at Accrington, Everton win 2-1. On the same day at Anfield, a crowd of 5,000 watched the reserves win 3-2 against Hunley.

Not everybody was happy though, some fans complained about the entrances and exits at Anfield. They were a disgrace to a club of Everton's stature. If there is an important game only the strong gain admission with the weak going to the wall and often into the mud.

The football on the pitch was excellent but trouble was never far away. In **Page 27** September a letter from Mr. Orrell the owner of the site Anfield was built on asked for certain alterations to be carried out, if these were not done he would withdraw the tenancy. John Houlding thought that he had sorted it all out when he said a limited liability company would be formed. Orrell said he would sell at 7s 6d a sq. yard. He owned 13,000 sq. yards. Houlding owned 15,000 sq. yds adjacent to the site, he was willing to sell for £6,000.

279 members attended a meeting and they refused to allow this "Policy of Shylock" Houlding threatened to dispossess the club and form a new one. This made matters much worse.

Things quietened down but it was always there in the background waiting to explode. On the 4th October Everton played Derby at home and they gave them a hiding, 7-0 it was 5-0 at half time Geary & Milward once more got two apiece, Brady, Chadwick & Kirkwood got the others.

Aston Villa away at Perry Barr, the game ends 2-2 but the Police protection to get off the pitch!! Fred Geary got both goals, his eleventh goal in six games.

18th October and heavy rain had left Anfield looking like a quagmire. It didn't hinder the skilful play of EFC, we won 2-0

Everton were riding high, top of the table, unbeaten and a game with West Bromwich at Anfield coming up on the 25th October, they were struggling and would eventually finish bottom of the League, you all know what's coming next, don't you? Yes our beloved Everton, in time honoured tradition (even if it was only three seasons old) lose for the first time this season, the score was 3-2.

This dented the Blue Boys confidence and they lose again the in the next game to Notts County away 3-1.

The fault lay with the goalkeeper Angus, well he took the can, he was dropped for the next match Smalley took over in goal for the trip to Blackburn, we lost 2-1 and Angus was back the following week against Sunderland at home. Sunderland were a great team and it was important to win this game, we manage a slender 1-0 victory.

The hardest game of the season, November 22nd away to Preston North End, we had slipped to 3rd place and Preston were just three points behind us but had games in hand. We lose 2-0 and Preston creep to within one point of us, Wolves were top and Blackburn 2nd.

Blackburn at home on Novemebr 29th and David Jardine plays in goal, the third keeper this season for the Blues. This is a vital game for both clubs and Everton get the valuable two points with a fine 3-1 victory.

December 6th and another tough game, Wolves away, the Salmon & Blues do their stuff and Geary gets the only goal that puts Everton on top of the League.

December 13th and Derby away, the Blue Boys play like champions and win 6-2, Thomas Wylie, who only played in four games this season scores four of the goals, Geary & Brady get one each.

Up to Sunderland on the 20th December a snow covered pitch sees Everton slip up, we lose 1-0.

Everton players need

John Holt was a fine Centre Half for Everton, he was only 5ft 5in tall or Page28 small but he had everything you could ask for in a player.

He also had guile, when the referee wasn't looking John took his revenge on those that had been throwing their weight about. He was a strong character and was often up before the committee at Anfield. He threatened more than once to leave the club if he didn't get his own way.

Boxing Day and a crucial game at Anfield for the Blues, if we beat Accrington, it would be looking good for the Championship. The game was a thriller which went Everton's way in the end 3-2. The next day, another match at home, this time against Burnley, there was no doubt about this result, Everton won 7-3, Chadwick 3, Latta 2, Milward and Brady The game brought Everton's 50th goal of the season and there looked like a lot more to come.

Into the New Year 1891 and another game at home the opponents this time were Aston Villa. The Blue Boys slammed in another 5 goals in a great 5-0 win. The City was buzzing, could Everton bring home the Championship Title? Nineteen games had been played and EFC were on top of the League, with 27pts, next were Wolves on 24 and then Preston North End also on 24 but with games in hand.

January 8th at home once more, Notts County the visitors, this match was described as the best game of the season at Anfield, so it must have been a bit special, the result was a 4-2 victory for Everton and the Championship was within reach.

January 10th and the biggest game of the season at Anfield, Preston North End were the team we had to beat, to sign seal and deliver the Championship. The game was played at a hectic pace but the quality of North End shone through, they had won the last two Championships and were not going to give the third away without a fight. Preston took the lead and no matter what the Blue Boys threw at them we could not put the ball into the net.

No League games were played in February but Everton kept their fitness with a run of friendly games. One game at The Chuckery (see page 31) against Walsall Town Swifts gave an outing for GEARY & Brady to help them keep their sharpness in front of goal.

The most important day in Everton's short history arrived March 14th 1891 would either go down in History or be forgotten within a week. The match was at Burnley and even though transport was hard to come by, nearly one thousand Evertonian's made their way to Turf Moor.

The atmosphere would have been Electric, except of course there was no Electric, so it must have been thrilling. Everton just one point ahead of Preston North End needed to win to be sure of the Title. The day was a foul one, with snow and sleet getting in the way of any creative football. With only four minutes to go the score was 2-2, not good enough for the Blues if Preston were winning up at Sunderland. EFC opened up to try and get the winner but disaster struck. Burnley scored with a goal from Stewart, the hearts of all the Evertonians inside the ground stopped, their heads dropped and tears welled up in their eyes. The final whistle blew and all they could do was sit and pray that Sunderland had beaten Preston.

They filed out of the ground and made for their transport, no news had come through yet as to the other score. Most of the Blue Boys were back home before it was confirmed that Sunderland had beaten Preston North End and that Everton Football Club were the English Champions.

The City went mad, everybody was celebrating this great achievement, Page 29 things had to be sorted out.

At this time in Football History the Champions used to get a flag that they would display at their ground the following season to show that they were the Champions.

But the League in their wisdom decided that a trophy should be presented to the winning team and so for the first time, Everton Football Club became the proud holders of the brand new League Championship trophy.

It was presented to them at the Football League Meeting held at the Compton Hotel Liverpool on May 28th 1891.

The trophy itself was designed by Vaughton's of Birmingham, it cost 50 guineas (£52 50p) Everton also made history by deciding to give medals to the players, this wasn't done by Preston North End the previous winners or the Football League, in fact the Football League didn't give medals until the 1910-11 season.. The medals were also made by Vaughton's .

However the medal presentation caused something of a stir, Everton for whatever reason gave medals to those players that had been on the books at the start of the season. The medals and £5 were given to the original twelve players, others like Jardine who played ten out of the twenty two matches got £4 but no medal.

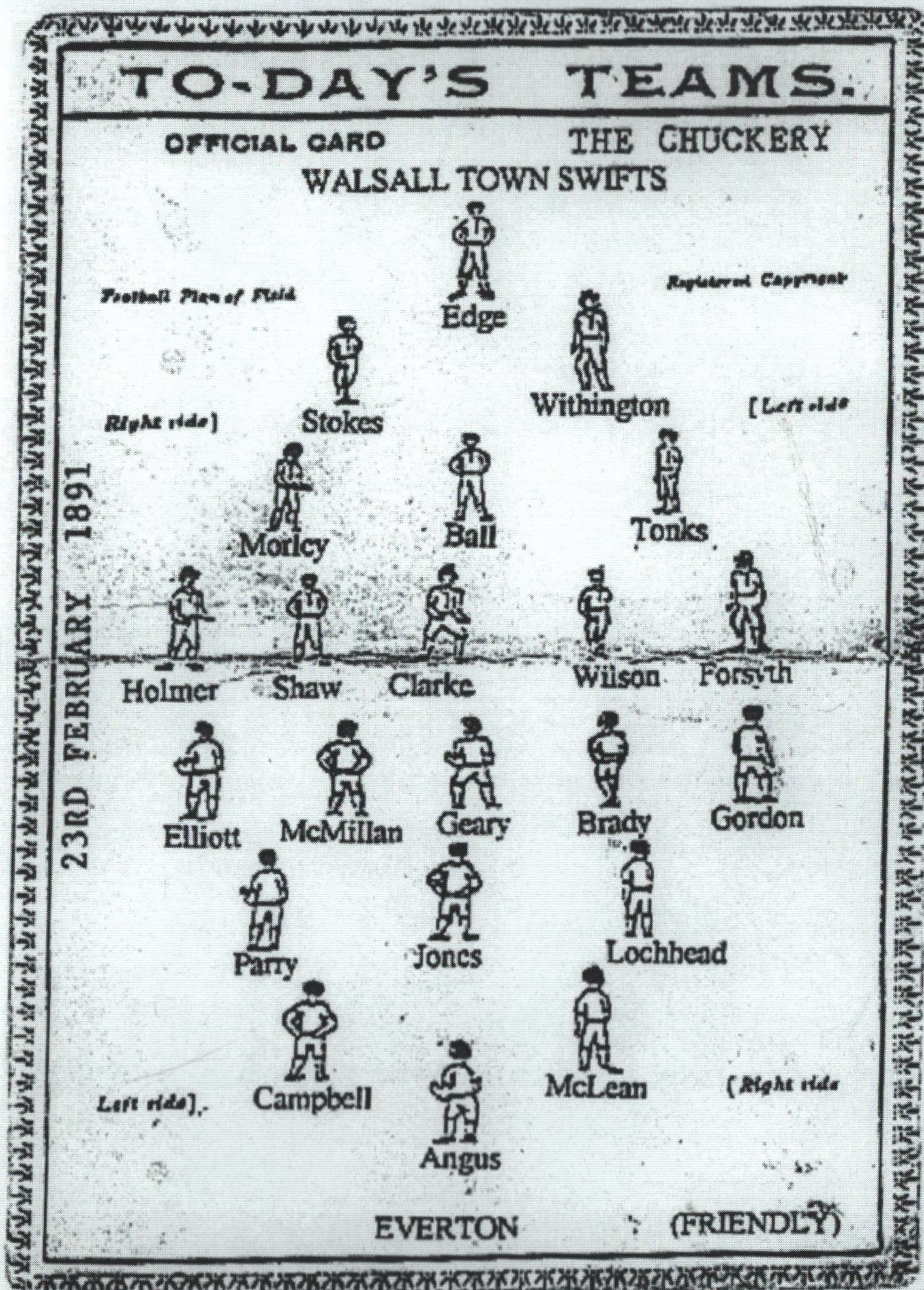

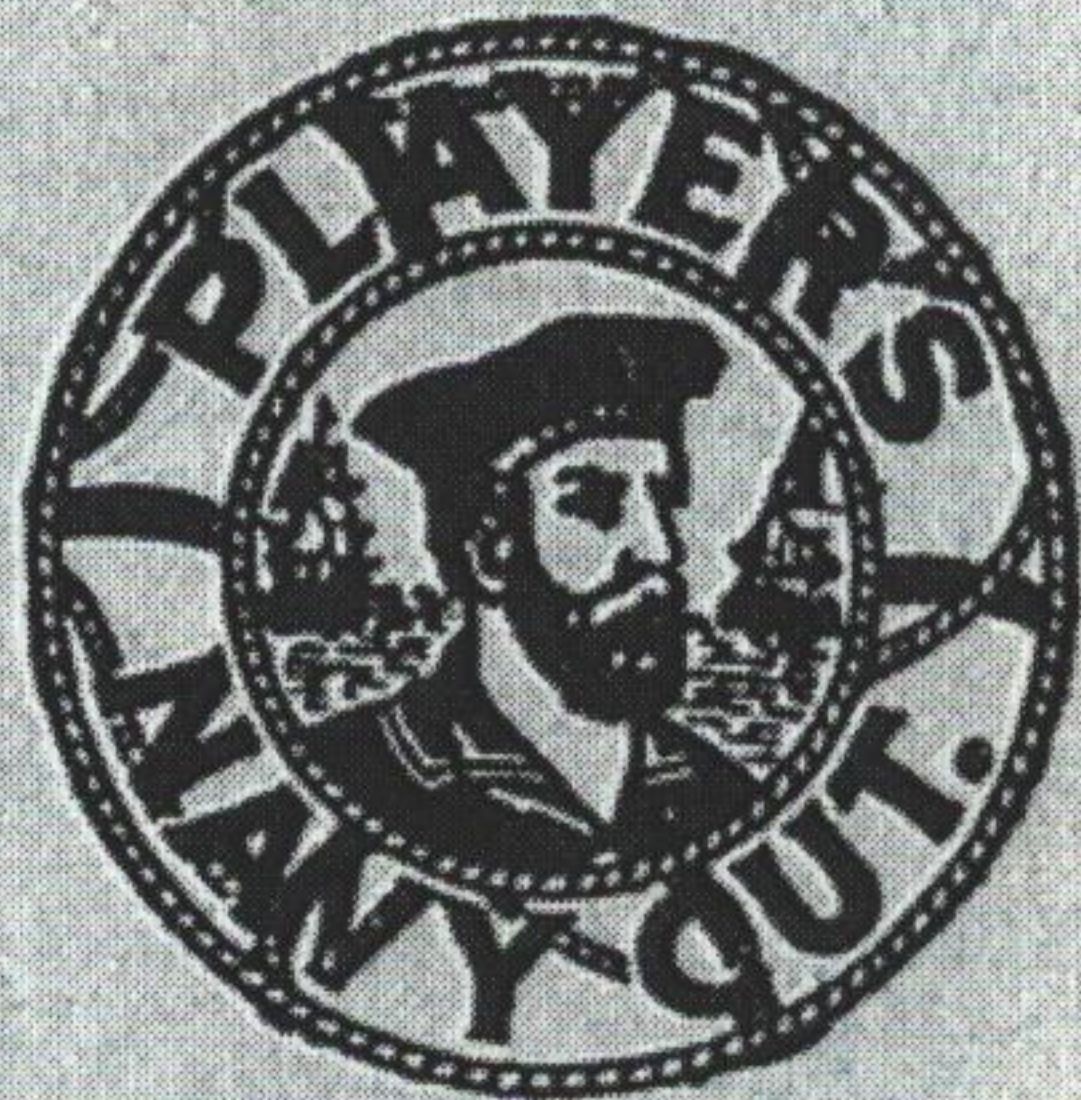
