stayed after the final whistle to buy a ticket?

Some of the letters in this issue deal with that and it makes you wonder how Everton

even manage to pay the staff.

If Bill Kenwright is a so called businessman then I am sorry to say, he seems to have lost the plot. Everton Football Club is run like a Church Hall Charity and that's being unfair to those Charity's because they are better run than Everton.

A Box Office that will not sell tickets over the phone by credit card!!! A Megastore

closed on Christmas Eve!!!!

Come on Bill the farces should only be on at the Empire not at Goodison Park.

The figures tell the tale, or so they say, once again Everton are talked about in the media as a cash strapped club, up to our eyeballs in debt, but why?

We have good attendance's, a large season ticket following and great away support, which the club make money from by laying on transport and selling tickets. Maybe the Club should look at itself, it's hard to believe but Bill Kenwright runs a very successful London Ticket Agency that books all his productions, phone a London Theatre Box Office and you will have no problem getting the tickets you want, for the performance you want and seats where you want them.

Try ringing Everton's Box Office, which I did at the beginning of December, I was trying to get two tickets for my son and his friend, who where coming home for Christmas.

I am a season ticket holder and had a list of seats around me that are usually occupied by different people every match. I was hoping that I could get my son as near as possible to my seat.

I told the lady at the ticket office that I wanted to book two tickets for the Man United match with my credit card. She informed me that I could not book at the Box Office but had to phone an 0870 number, the Ticketline.

I duly did that, only to be answered by a machine, "if you want tickets for such and such a game press 1, if you want, well you know what I mean. I pressed every button that appertained to me but as the process grew longer and longer, I realised, how could I explain to a machine that I wanted certain seats? After about three minutes of futile Machine Talk, I hung up.

I told my son that the game was sold out but as a treat I would take him and his friend to see Lord of the Rings instead.

I phoned the cinema, a human answered, I booked three tickets with my credit card. I had saved over £45 and had got the seats I wanted, Everton lost over £65.

The next instance that our beloved Club lost money was before the Charlton game, I went to the ticket office to try and buy tickets for an upcoming away game only to be told only tickets for today's match are on sale, WHY? They didn't seem to know why, it was just because they said so.

How many people tried to buy tickets that day and were refused? How many would have still wanted them after that result? How much did Everton lose?

Finally as I live a fair distance outside the City Centre and only get into town on very rare occasions, I decided to make a visit for the January sales. The City was very busy and I found some bargains, on the way home I thought I would call into the Megastore and see if there was anything I fancied, it was 3pm on Sunday the 6th January, the store was closed, yes, even though there was a host of people out and about shopping Everton deemed it not worthwhile to open.

Is it any wonder we are in debt, a Box Office that will not sell tickets, a Club that has 30,000 fans milling about before a game but again will not sell them tickets for any other game except the one they already have tickets for and finally a Megastore that seems to not understand the word MEGA. I worked out that Everton had lost over £100 alone from me, how many others doesn't bare thinking about.






Some more views about Everton in Chile and I have to amend a mistake in issue 4 the correct web site for Everton in Chile is www.algorta.demon.co.uk

The list is endless, every fan would be responsible for the result, no "sack the board", "hang the manager" banners anymore.


Will it ever happen, who knows but if it does, wouldn't it be nice to slip over to Anfield and buy a season ticket just for fun?

At the Sunderland game, you could once again feel the crowds nerves, just relax, shout your support and watch as the "Blues Cruise."



On the 3rd January 2000 I wrote in the Everton Matchday programme

about the Tour of the USA & Canada in 1956.

Since then I have been given more information and newspaper cuttings from that Tour, so I thought that I would retrace my steps and show you some long lost items of our History.

Everton sailed out of England on the Queen Elizabeth and after seven days at sea landed in New York Harbour.

They went stright on a city tour which lasted all afternoon and into the early evening.

On Wednesday 17th May the players got into seven hired cars and with a Police motorcycle escort, went to the Town Hall to meet Mayor Leo. P. Carlin. The newspapers had been running articles about "Everton Booters or English Booters" ar-

riving for a tour of Soccer.

The first game was played at the Newark School Stadium, against Falcons Portuguese team. Don Donavon got a hat trick for Everton, with the first goal coming after just three minutes, it stayed 1-0 until half time. After the break Everton piled on the pressure and won 4-0. Jimmy Harris getting the other goal, a crowd of 1,500 watched the game.

On Sunday the 20th May Everton went to Downing Stadium Randall's Island, where at 3pm they played a USA All Stars Team a crowd of 4,312 turned up and watched as Everton turned on the style. The Blues went 3-0 up in the first half with goals from Peter Farrell, Jimmy Harris and Alex Farrell.

In the second half Jimmy Harris got two more for his hat trick and Don Donavon made it 6-0 before Brian Harris completed the scoring to make it 7-0.

Everton moved on to Ludlow, Western Massachusetts, the press had again been hyping up the forthcoming match. One headline read "Everton Soccer Team one of the Worlds Best" The players were described as

"As nimble footed a clan of musclemen as ever appeared on the chewed up

Franklin Park pitch."

3,000 people turned up to watch these English Musclemen win 4-1. Porky Ferreira scored for Lusitanos, Jimmy Harris, Alex Farrell, Eric Moore and Brian Harris got Everton's goals.

The players returned to New York to prepare for their next match which was to be at The Randall Stadium against German team Schwaben on Wed 30th May.

Everton Booters Open in Newark




He isn't the first player to question what is happening at Everton, others have been offloaded as well for daring to challenge mighty Walter.


If you send your list to Blue Blood it will be passed on to the various collectors that are interested in that particular item.


the next round.

Man City away on the 2nd March and we get a reasonable 0-0 draw. Three days later it's another defeat, this time away to Sunderland.

The "Big Game" the F.A. Cup at Old Trafford and the Blues play brilliantly only to

be robbed in the last minute, everyone is sick.

Southampton at home and we win 2-0, Heath and Sheedy on target, the team is struggling, there are injury problems, Andy King, Peter Reid and David Johnson all miss the "Derby" at the pit. We are all dreading the result, if they can slam us at home what will happen here. I had already booked an appointment for plastic surgery when the Boys came to my aid and got a great 0-0 draw. Pride is restored, we can strut around again. Home to Arsenal and Ainscow gets only his fourth full game of the season, he scores, so does Heath but once again we lose 3-2. We are in 9th place not bad you might think but not good enough, we need to be in Europe. Forest away and we lose, bye, bye Europe. Only eight games left, Borrows leaves for Bolton. Terry Curran asks for too much money and is sent back to the steel city. We beat Stoke at home 2-0. Up to Dundee for a friendly, no match in the Cup and we draw 1-1. Brighton away and a good win. Man United at home and the blues roll on, we beat them 2-0 Birmingham away and Mountfield makes his debut, we lose1-0. Southall comes back into the team for the home game against Wet Ham, we win 2-0 thanks to two Sharp goals. May 4th Coventry at home and an all time low since the war, only 12, 872 attend, we win 1-0. Luton away and the Blue Boys play great, we win 5-1, Sharp 2, Sheedy 2, and Johnson. May 14th is the date of the last game, it ends 1-1 against Ipswich at home, we finish 7th not bad. Mick Walsh and Trevor Ross are given free transfers.



The pre - season friendlies saw some new faces, Alan Harper and Trevor Steven had joined the club, Alan Ainscow, Mike Walsh, Mick Ferguson and Steve McMahon had all left. McMahon had left with the Everton fans calling him a "Judas" as he only wanted to play for money and not the famous Blue shirt.

On the 6th August we beat Walsall 3-0 away it was a costly win because Ratcliffe was sent off and missed the first two League games. From the 9-11th August Everton took part in the Drectsteden Tournament beating Haarlem 3-1 and drawing 0-0 with Dordrecht, we lost 4-3 on penalties. On the 14th

August we drew 2-2 with Groningen, then beat Oldham away 2-0 on the 19th August. Things might be heading in the right direction for once. The new season looks

promising.

It started with a home game against Stoke City, Graeme Sharp gets the goal. he was starting off in fine form, as he had been towards the end of last season. You think I of all people would know better than to praise the Blue Boys, yes only three nights later we get beat at home to West Ham. Jim Arnold is still in goal, with no place for Southall. Mountfield had taken over from the suspended Ratcliffe in the first two matches but made way for him in the third game. which is Coventry away. We get a 1-1 draw thanks to Sheedy. Terry Curran signs in as a fully fledged Blue Boy after his loan spell last season and the breakdown in talks it seemed as if he would never arrive. He played in the match at Ipswich, it didn't help us, we lost 3-0.

Only 15,548 come to the next home game against West Brom, they have to endure a boring 0-0 draw. Things had slipped since that first home win and a trip to Spurs didn't make any Blue confident. Everton do the unexpected once again and win 2-1,

Peter Reid with his first goal for the Blues is helped by a goal from Sheedy.

Martin Hodge leaves for Sheff Wed and Alan Irvine asks to go on the transfer list. Birmingham at home and another draw, 1-1 this time, Sharps scored, it was watched by another poor crowd of 15,253. The recession was biting deep on Merseyside, I was still unemployed and found it hard getting to home games. Only with lifts from mates did I make it. The 2nd Leg of the Milk Cup and we draw with Chesterfield at home, we scrape through on the away goal, things are not going to plan, the Evertonians are fed up


with Kendall's chopping and changing, he doesn't seem to know who to




Back to League football and over to Old Trafford, the Blues win again, Sheedy slams in the winner, the travelling Army can't believe it.

Boxing Day and a home match against Sunderland, there is no Christmas spirit here,


it's bloody awful, 0-0 and only 18,683 a very sad holiday crowd.


New Years Eve, Coventry at home, 0-0 13,659, cold, miserable fans hurl more abuse at



In The Blue Corner

The silence from the Boardroom before the Stoke game could almost be heard, as Evertonians waited with baited breath for news from their leaders.

Late on Friday afternoon a prepared statement was read out to the press by Darren Griffiths. It mentioned the Youth Academy and Bellefield and promised money for both. It went on to say that the Club had managed to refinance and money was now available for Walter Smith.

The statement was issued by Michael Dunford not Kenwright or Carter.

When it was digested by the waiting fans there seemed some confusion, because the Academy and Bellefield news was "Old News" heard before not so long ago and the amount of money available was not announced. Nor were the details of how this money came to be "Available".

There was no "Vote of Confidence" or offer of a new extended contract for Walter, in fact neither, Walter or the board have talked about contracts and considering Smith's contract runs out in just over a years time you would have thought that either one of them would have at least mentioned it.

Strange then that Walter seemed to take this announcement in his stride, not over praising it or ignoring it, just a small but very significant statement to the press, saying that he was grateful for the news but the game was the most important thing to concentrate on.

When asked by a Times reporter if he was looking forward to the day Everton moved into their new stadium at the Kings Dock in 2005 (only 3 years away) his reply was startling. "I can't envisage myself being here by then"

Why not? Is the question and maybe the answer lies in a little rumour that has been doing the rounds up in Dundee.

The story goes that Richard Gough has returned from the States looking for a coaching role in Britain, true so far, and that he will invest his money along with Walter Smith in Dundee United. Jim McLean the manager will step down and Walter and Gough will be joint managers.

Walter will train Richard up and then move into the role of "Director of Football". Outrageous, not true, won't happen, load of rubbish, yes I know that's what many will say. But go back and read what Walter said about the Kings Dock, then think why no new contract?



Televised Football

Everton's home game against Chelsea was a pay per view game on Sky T.V. the attendance was 10, 000 below capacity, was this because of the cameras? or because it was a Sunday game? or are there other reasons involved?

First of all, Everton like most other clubs have supporters from all over the country. If you live in London are you going to get up early on a Sunday morning, try and get a train, or coach or drive up to Goodison Park, where you will have to pay at least £18.50p to get in never mind the cost of your transport? The alternative is to pay £8.00 to Sky T.V. and watch it at home, saving a lot of money and at least six hours of travelling.

The days when supporters would travel no matter what the cost are over, they have other priorities, like getting to work the next day or saving for a

holiday.

On top of all the other problems they would be watching a game that turned out to be very poor indeed, at least at home you can switch off.

Everton have tried to encourage fans into the ground with special offers, like the Derby County £10 adult seat. At first glance this looks like a good idea but some season ticket holders where not very happy, stating that they felt ripped off by this "Offer".

You can understand them, if a game is televised, season ticket holders have no option, they have already paid for the match, there are no rebates and with the reduced price games they again have paid "up Front" and do not

benefit in any way.

Now the Cup game against Leyton Orient has been declared a "Reduced Price Game" you might think that season ticket holders would be happy with this but no, in the past as a season ticket holder you could go and reserve your seat for a Cup Tie, making sure that you sat with your friends but the Orient game is pay on the day, so if you like me arrive late at the ground because you have to work on a Saturday morning then you might find "Your Seat" gone.

A Club with Everton's problems does not need any more and if season ticket holders think that maybe next season, it would be better to pay on the day and watch only the non televised matches live then Everton might be in

more financial trouble.

It is a tricky problem but I can't understand why season ticket holders are not allowed to keep their seat for Cup Ties. Maybe the office staff can't handle all the extra work.

The Club may think it can ignore it's season ticket holders because they have already paid but what about this new financial deal that gives the season ticket sales for the next 20 years away as some kind of "security" for a repackaging deal. If the season ticket sales drop off where does this other company get it's repayments from?

The History Of Everton Football Club

Part Five 1891/92

Everton start the season as Champions and they intended to keep the Championship at Anfield.

Things didn't start the way they were planned, Johnny Holt, Everton's firebrand centre half had decided to go on strike. He felt that the Club Committee were not treating him in a fair and proper manner.

The Committee themselves were at loggerheads most of the time, turmoil

would be a good word to use.

John Houlding was once again flexing his muscles, he thought that he could buy Everton Football Club and turn it into a Limited Company but he was strongly opposed.

The players on the other hand seemed to be waiting to prove to the world that last season's triumph was not going to be a one off. They went to West


Brom and duly lost 4-0, not the best of starts to the campaign.

Everton journeyed up to Scotland to play two friendlies Kings Park in Stir-

ling and Queens Park in Glasgow.

Stoke and Darwen had joined the League, boosting it to 14 teams, we met Darwen on the 7th September and managed to beat them comfortably 5-3 at Anfield.

September was to be a troublesome month for Everton, not on the pitch but in the boardroom. On the 15th at the Royal Street Hall, close to Everton Valley



M.J. Earp only played 9 games for E.F.C.

John Houlding announced that he wanted to buy Anfield, the price was quoted as £9, 237 Mr Orrell the present owner was willing to sell his land, he owned 13,000 sq yds, for which he wanted 7s/6d per sq yd. Houlding, owned 15,000 sq yds adjacent to the site, he was willing to sell for £6,000. 279 members refused to allow this "Policy of Shylock."

Houlding threatened to disposes the Club and form a one. This only made matter worse.

On 14th November Eventravelled to Darwen. M.J.E. a full back made his debut. Everton, we lost?

Everton managed to beat West Brom in a close fought game, the Page28 Blues won 4-3, Alex Latta got a hat trick.

The joy was short lived though because on the 21st November

Everton travelled to Wolverhampton. Hungary Wolves made a meal out of Everton, were the headlines, we get hammered 5-1 4,500 watch.

As things go we were inconsistent to say the least, just one week later we win 5-1 against Aston Villa.

A meeting was held and "bad feeling" was on the Agenda, Houlding and Mahon were virtually head to head or toe to toe, neither man wanted to let go of what they assumed they held.

Houlding, thought he was "King John" the untouchable and Mahon thought it was his duty to save Everton from this "King".

Insults were flying in right, left and centre, Houlding proposed forming a Limited Company but this did not go down well with his opponents.

Another meeting on January 25th 1892 sealed King Johns fate, his proposal to

form a Limited Company was thrown out.. Houlding had given Everton notice to quit and when someone questioned George Mahon on where he was going to find a new ground, his reply was "I have one in my pocket" laughter broke out amongst Mahon's supporters because they knew that the ground he

was referring to was Mere Green Field, which was on the North side of Stanley Park. It was described as being "Degenerated from a nursery into a howling desert".

On March 15th 1892 a meeting with 500 members present at The College in Shaw Street. They again voted to throw out Houldings proposals and voted to move from Anfield only 18 voted against. Houlding claimed that he was "On Trial" A fund was formed for the new Club and it soon reached £1, 517.

On March the 21st the Liverpool Post newspaper carried the story that Mahon was more than willing to pay Houlding a fair rent and stay at Anfiled but King John never replied to

Mahon's letter, the die had been cast there was no going back.

On the pitch things were much the same, up one minute down the next, we beat Notts County at Anfield 4-0 only to lose the next home game against Bolton 5-2!!

The team improved enough to finish 5th, with all the upheaval in the Page29 boardroom this was not a bad effort.

Meanwhile agents had inspected possible alternative sites but Mere green was the best.

The Club loyalists formed a Limited Liability Company (this had been talked about since May 22nd 1889) the aim was to purchase the land which we know today as Goodison Park.

£8,090 was required and that was a substantial amount of money to raise.



This cartoon like skit was printed in the Liverpool Review on March 26th 1892.

It gave the impression that "King John Houlding" had been toppled. Indeed in some ways he had.

His insistence on an increased rent which was grossly unfair seemed to sway even the most loyal of his supporters.

Without Everton Football Club to pay rent at Anfield where would he turn? What would he do? Those were the questions raised in the press. Those who knew Houlding well knew that he would not give in without a fight and so it was.

King John fought to keep the name Everton Football Club and started another football team. What happened next, is as they say "History"






