struggled to score goals. Berti would be better off keeping his thoughts on his players private and try and act with some dignity.



More rumours and facts are flying around Merseyside some are saying that the deal is set and no problems are seen. Others however are saying that there is a boardroom split and Everton have not told the Council their plans for Goodison Park when they leave.

The sale of Goodison Park was thought to be for either the Communities benefit or for more housing but it know appears that Everton could be selling the site as a retail venture, which includes supermarkets. This will bring Everton about £15 million which would be enough for the Club to fund the Kings Dock Project.

If. However the sale is for housing only half that amount would be raised, leaving

Everton with a very large financial shortfall.

Paul Clegg, who is Everton's main financial backer has stated that he will not sign a cheque for £30 million to underwrite the project unless he has a more secure footing on Everton's board. This could mean Carter getting moved "Upstairs" while Kenwright take the Chairman's job, leaving Clegg as Vice Chairman.

Paul Clegg is something of a mystery man, he seems to have no interest in football

and is only in this for financial gain and maybe to massage his ego.

The Council say they were not aware that the Club had plans for Goodison to be a Retail site and they might not give the Club permission to follow this line of thought. Others on the fringe of the project say that all these little niggles are usual in a bid

like this and everything will turn out right.

Who do you believe? Again it's uncertain just what is fact and what is fiction but there are some strange things being said and if you listen just a little more carefully than some you will be as confused as everyone else.

For example the "Liverpool Summer Pops" which was held at the Kings Dock this summer in a giant Marquee was an outstanding success, according to the Council, stars like Bryan Ferry, Elton John, Shirley Bassey and Tony Bennett all made appearances.

The Council spokesman said "The event was brilliant, another feather in the City's

cap and we are looking forward to next years event"

How come they are looking forward to next years event? If everything is "Hunky Dory" with Evertons plan, then surely, the Kings Dock site will be a building site next summer, with no place for a massive Marquee!!!

I have always doubted the Kings Dock project, maybe I am the odd man out and

maybe I will be laughed off Merseyside when it does get built.

But I do not believe that a City that ignores thousands of commuters trying to get into and out of the City every day, will all of a sudden start to worry about stranded football fans on a cold wet Wednesday night.

If the people that keep the City running with all their commerce can't be provided


Why does Kevin Campbell take so much stick?





This is a postcard featuring Locomotives named after Football Clubs
It's from a painting which shows LNER Locomotive named "Everton" at the end of the war hauling an ambulance train past Brunswick sheds towards Liverpool Central Station. Painted in wartime black at the time, she originally entered service in January 1937 and was withdrawn in February 1960. This was one of 25 Locomotives in Class B17.


It just goes to show you that you can't really judge people be their appearance.

team winning 1-0.



Another change that caused uproar was the new "White Bib" strip, most Blues hated


it and there were many angry letters to Everton and the Echo.



goal by ex Blue Darren Hughes, thanks mate. West Ham away, they are playing well at the moment and are contenders for our crown, we slip up and lose 2-1.

John Bailey leaves Everton for Newcastle, he wasn't the best full back we have ever had but he was a "Blue" and as such should be remembered with due respect.

It's November and football violence is at it's most crucial phase, a Chelsea fan has been found guilty of riot and assault, he is given a life sentence, some people are shocked by others are glad that at long last vicious thugs are getting the criminal punishment they deserve. Some even thought it would stop the trouble overnight, they were wrong, on the following Saturday Millwall were at home to Leeds and there was trouble everywhere, the press said that it looked as if the Chelsea trial meant nothing to these morons.

Everton were at home that day to Arsenal and there was murder at Goodison Park, not between rival fans but poor old Arsenal got murdered 6-1, yes the rampant Blues rip them to shreds. Well Kevin lad how about getting home at 4am from Bournemouth and then having to get up for work two hours later, that's what most of the travelling Boys have to put up with. Try Norwich away midweek for the Screen Cup, try watching a defeat, then try to get some much needed sleep on the long journey home before work once again.

Back to the football as I said Chelsea at home, We lose 2-1 in another bad tempered game and so we go out of our favourite Cup.

# Everton Firsts

In Celebration Of Everton's Achievement "100 Years At The Top Of English Football." Blue Blood Has Decided To Run A Series Of Articles On Other "Firsts" Gained By Either The Club Or It's Players

Goodison Park was awarded the honour of being the First League Ground to hold the F. A. Cup Final.

The date was 31st march 1894 and Everton put in a fine effort to have Goodison looking at it's finest.

Extra stands were put up in anticipation of a large crowd, The two teams contesting the final were Bolton Wanderers and Notts County.

On the day a disappointing crowd of 20,000 turned up to watch, what everyone thought was going to be a walk over for the 1st Division Bolton over 2nd Division County.

Bolton had been hit badly with injuries and five of their regular team were missing from the action. And action was the right word, from the start Bolton came under the cosh, only brilliant goalkeeping by 'John Willy' Sutcliffe kept the Wanderers in the match but even he had to give way to the onslaught. Logan of Notts County got a hat trick and County ran out easy winners 4-1.

This was the first time a 2nd Division Club had won the Cup, and the City of Nottingham went wild in celebration.



If you are looking for any pre-war opening day meets, you will find a few; one each in the 1920's and the 1930's.


But perhaps the strangest meets were during the 1910's.

Everton versus Tottenham was a fixture on no less that 4 out of 5 seasons. And again the sequence is spooky..... they played each other at the start of the 1910, the 1911, and the 1912 seasons!, but not at the start of the 1913 season.


Richard Wright has not played that many games and it is hard to assess him but he doesn't look like he is full of confidence.

# The History Of Everton Football Club

Part 1893/94

October 14th 1893 and Everton are at home to Blackburn, Milward & Southworth score but once again the game ends in a draw 2-2.

The attendance's were not as big as the previous season, Everton had taken £8, 815 then but £3,539 went on players wages.

But those who went to Goodison Park on the 21st October certainly got their moneys worth. Darwen were the visitors and were led like lambs to the slaughter, Everton

turned on the style and hit eight goals Darwen managed one. The scorers were Alex Latta 2, Maxwell 2, Southworth 2, Bell & Chadwick completed the rout.

The crowd were buzzing as they left the gourd, surely now we can win the next game and therefore put two back to back victories on the records.

Home again but this game would be much harder, the mighty Preston North End were the opponents.

A hard test, which Everton failed to pass, Jack Southworth managed to score twice but Preston got three.

4th November and away to

Sheffield Wednesday, only a 1-1 draw, Milward the scorer. 11th November and a defeat by Derby County at home, 2-1 Latta getting our consolation goal.

The gates were dwindling and the Boardroom unrest was not helping matters, there was some in-fighting going on.

Southworth had scored 8 goals in nine games, so he was doing his bit to help out. But as in all things Everton he missed the next three games through injury. We still managed to win without him as we beat Burnley at home 4-3 Bell 2, Chadwick & Geary.

December 2nd Newton Heath away and we manage what seemed the impossible and get two wins on the trot, 3-0 Geary 2, Chadwick.

Two days later we land with a bump back down to earth, we lose 2-0 at Wolves the first time we had failed to score in a match this season.

December the 9th and the much awaited return of Southworth, Sheffield United away, he gets two gaols and Milward the other in a fine 3-0 victory. December 16th and Jack Southworth returns to Blackburn with his new Everton team-mates. He is given a heroes return kind of welcome. The Blackburn fans loved him, the game was a thriller and Southworth scored but Everton lost 4-3 Bell & Chadwick also finding the net.



Smart Arridge

A defender born near Sunderland Smart played 51 games for EFC a Gentleman Footballer who specialised in the shoulder charge.

The next two matches have gone done in the Everton History books, rec-Page28 ords created in these games still stand to this day. On the 23rd December 1893 Everton were at home against Sheffield Wednesday, Southworth scored four goals, Bell two, Chadwick one and Latta one. Everton ran out 8-1 winners.

One week later again at home Everton won 7-1 against West Brom Southworth, this time scored six goals, still an Everton record to this day, Bell got the other goal in a great game. It was foggy and a crowd of 25, watched, within a minute bell put the ball into the net to send Everton one up. Smart Arridge making his debut had to scramble the ball off the line to stop an equaliser

Latta and Bell created the first for Southworth, his second came after the Albion goalkeeper fumbled the ball, the hat trick goal was a special solo effort, dribbling the ball from the half way line before lashing it into the net. It was 4-0 at half time and West Brom trudged towards the dressing room with a look of fear on their faces. Just after the restart Southworth struck again, after Bell laid the ball on for him.

West Brom tried to create chances but they were overwhelmed by Everton. Stewart made a mistake and Albion scored. Bell again laid on a goal for Jack and Latta also set up Southworth. That made it an amazing ten goals in two games for Southworth, he was fats becoming the idol of the Goodison faithful.

New Years Day 1894 and another six goal thriller, but this time the goals are shared by both teams. Darwen scored three to give their fans an unbeaten start to the New Year. Southworth once again scored, only once but that was enough, Chadwick and an og made up the three goals for EFC.

6th January at home to Newton Heath, Southworth gets a goal and so does Chadwick, in a 2-0 win.

The next game was to prove just how much Everton had improved over the last fewe months. Preston away was never going to be easy but Everton made it look that way with an excellent 4-2 win. Chadwick, Milward an og and, oh, yes Southworth score.

This was Jack Southworth's 16th goal in 7 games, unbelievable!!!

The long awaited "Twin Spearhead" of Fred Geary and Jack Southworth took to the field for the first time at Nottingham Forest. Southworth would be relishing the thought of the master creator Geary alongside him, all the signs pointed to a great victory but as I have mentioned before, you must always take into account, the fact that we are Evertonians and as such, normal logic doesn't apply. Jack Southworth fails to score, Geary manages one and along with another og we get two but Forest get three. The dream ticket of Southworth & Geary is no longer seen as a priceless asset.

The F. A. Cup is next up and away to a poor Stoke City team should get Everton back on track, wrong again, we lose 1-0 heartbroken Evertonians kiss goodbye to their F. A. Cup.

February 3rd and away to West Brom, the victims of a 7-1 thrashing at Goodison, ok you have guessed it, we lose 3-1, Bell scored.

Stoke away in the League Geary is missing but Southworth plays, all to no avail, we crash to another defeat 3-1 Southworth managed to score.

Into March and the return of the "Twin Spearhead", home to Wolves and at last the Spearhead hits the target, Geary 2, Southworth 1 and we win 3-0.

Only two days later Bolton at home and another win, 3-2, Chadwick, Hartley and

Southworth score.

April 7th 1894 and we are at home to Stoke, they have already beaten us twice, knocking us out of the F.A. Cup and the League. There was no Southworth in the Everton line up, so things looked bleak. Typical then of EFC to go out and smack them 6-2. Geary 2, Latta 2, Hartley & Mc Millan.

The season ended at Bolton on April the 16th. H. Reay plays his only game for Ever-

ton at outside right, he gets the only goal.

The review of the season was mixed, we should have done a whole lot better than we did but then again, we had seen the awesome power of Jack Southworth, he had scored 27 goals in 22 matches, "A Star Is Born" were the headlines in the press.

Everton finished in Sixth place.

Goodison Park had the honour of staging the Cup Final, Southworth had brought the spotlight back on the Blue Boys, so everything was rosy.

No it wasn't, remember I said there was some backbiting in the boardroom, well it

blew up into a full scale war.

The A.G.M was held at The Picton Lecture Hall in June 1894 and what happened that night was beautifully described in the Liverpool Review by a person only identified as The Linesman.

I will give you some of the detail of that meeting:

On Monday evening at the Picton Lecture Hall the long expected thunderbolt was hurled, and nobody was killed. But there were great ructions all the same and many a time during the three hours sitting of the directors and shareholders of the 'igh and mighty Everton Football Club a 'Fite' appeared imminent.

But it is all over now and as I say nobody is assassinated. On the contrary. The whole Club is decidedly the better for an annual meeting which commenced rumblingly, continued, with shouts, shrieks, groans, hisses, pale faces, and personalities and concluded with humorous speeches, facetious commentaries, votes of thanks, congratulations and hand shaking all round. After which, let us hope that patriotism will take the place of dissension amongst the members so the Everton F.C. and that the coming season will see better management, better results and hatchets buried by the score.


To a disinterested onlooker the proceedings in the Picton were of a most humorous description. A spectator who knew not football would probably have been amazed at the intensity of interest displayed by the five or six hundred club members who for three hours howled and gesticulated themselves blue in the face, Everton - blue in the face, over the affairs financial and governmental of their body.

Personally, it was the most entertaining partisan experience which I have come across since Liverpool beat Everton at Hawthorne Road in the final for the Liverpool Cup in 1893.




