
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

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

As a 3rd generation true-blue, an Everton shareholder, a Lotto agent and a season ticket holder of some 30 years standing (even though I am Manx born, bred and domiciled) I doubt whether I will be renewing my season ticket for 2008/09 if this is the way that the Premier League sells its soul to Sky and Setanta to the total disregard of the grass-root supporters.

As I put in my original message to the Premier League "will they be happy when all games are played in near-empty stadia while the one-time fans stay at home to watch on Sky?" Their response (or lack of it) was 'deafening' but, believe me, this is where it will end up.

I trust you will register our protest to the appropriate body and would wonder whether the Premier League and/or Sky TV will recompense me - and many, many others - for losing approx £250 each in air fares due to these enforced fixture changes ... and this is just for the period from Christmas.



On this photograph from the match between England and Spain, won 7 - 1 by the English, we see the famous English centre-forward Dixie Dean score a goal. Jumping high into the air he hits a cross with the side of his head into the back of the net. Even though you will best be able to direct the ball hitting it with your forehead, you should never pass up the opportunity to practise heading the ball with other areas of your head. Especially when you're close to goal it can be used to your advantage, as this picture shows.

Text below is from the Front Cover photo of Dixie Dean

"FOOTBALL-SKILLS AND TACTICS by C.J. GROOTHOFF" no. 56 He who jumps highest has the best chance! Here we see the famous English centre-forward Dixie Dean from championship-team* Everton, a record goal-scorer, in action. In between two West Ham United defenders, who of course give special attention to this dangerous opponent. The three op them jump up in the air to reach the ball, but Dixie Dean out jumps both of them to be able to head the ball on to a team-mate out of this picture. If you want to be successful header of the ball, you will need to be able to jump high!

The following article was sent to Arsenal Football Club with the hope that they would include it in their matchday programme for the Arsenal v Everton game on May4th 2008 which took place over the weekend of the 80th Anniversary. At the time of going to press I do not know if it appeared. They wanted me to edit it, here it is anyhow.

the crowd went quiet but Dixie got two goals, one from the penalty spot. The record Eighty years ago this weekend on May 5th 1928 Arsenal travelled to Everton for the last game of the 1927/28 season. It seemed at first glance to be a typical end of season fixture, Arsenal had lost in the Semi final of the F. A., Cup a few weeks before and Everton had clinched the League Title in their last game. But for two players this was a game that

tney would remember for the rest of their life.

Arsenal's Charles Buchan had decided to call an end to his illustrious career. He was signed from Sunderland three seasons before in what turned out to be an amazing trans-

fer.
Charles had played for Sunderland for fourteen years and was a prolific goal scorer, even though he was into his thirties new Arsenal Manager Herbert Chapman saw him as

the man to keep Arsenal in the limelight.

Chapman travelled up to Wearside and went into Buchan's Sports Shop, he introduced himself to Buchan but really there was no need. Chapman had been an exceptional Manager at Huddersfield and his exploits had been the reason Arsenal took him on. Buchan was surprised to see him and when Chapman asked if he would like to join Ar-

" Have you asked Sunderland about this?" Chapman replied "Of Course and they have

After contacting his manager at Sunderland and being told it was "Up to him" he duly signed for Arsenal.

It was only after everything had been signed that Buchan found out just what an amazing deal had been done...

Sunderland wanted a £4,000 fee but Arsenal only offered £2,000. The Directors at Sunderland said "He will score at least twenty goals a season for you" so Arsenal replied "If you are that confident then we will agree to £2,000 and £100 a goal in his first season" Sunderland where taken aback but finally agreed to this very strange deal, Buchan then had the job of repaying his former masters by scoring goals for another team. Luckily for Sunderland he managed to hit the net 21 times in the League and Cup so the

Final fee was £4,100, Sunderland were the winners. The other player who would remember this game for the rest of his life was Everton's William Ralph Dean better known to all as Dixie Dean. He had been a sensational signing from the other Merseyside Club Tranmere Rovers, for a £3,000 fee. He was still only 21 years of age in 1928 and had been in hospital eighteen months before with a fractured skull after a horrific motorcycle accident. Doctors at the time said he would never play football again. But Dixie was made of sterner stuff and he was soon back to his goal scoring ways, by the time of the last game of the season against Arsenal he had accumulated 57 League goals just two short of equalling the record of 59 set in the Second Division two years earlier. This was the First Division and Dixie was a mere boy, the Football World was astounded and many thought it would be impossible for him to equal the record never mind break it.

The day of the game saw thousands cram inside Goodison Park, before the game Arsenal Players presented Buchan with a brief case and writing set including Fountain pens and pencils. Buchan was to go into retirement and became an excellent sports writer and produced the best ever boys Football Magazine 'Charles Buchan's Football Monthly'.

Dixie was ready to meet his fate, ever the confident young man, he knew it would be hard to get past a very experienced Arsenal defence but he was determined to do his best. The week before the match he had been getting treatment for an injury, even late into the night before the game.

The match started with both teams taking each other on, Arsenal took the lead and the crowd went quiet but Dixie got two goals, one from the penalty spot. The record was 'On' and the noise was unbelievable. Only eight minutes to go and it looked as if Dean would have to share the record but then the ball floated over the penalty area, Dean leapt up in the air and placed a perfect header into the net. The crowd was said to have made so much noise that the Liver Birds at the Pier Head flapped their wings and were ready to fly off. Fans ran on the pitch and had to be led off by the Police. The game restarted and was coming to an end when Arsenal equalised. 3-3, probably the best result with hindsight. Buchan went out unbeaten and Dix1e got the record of 60 League goals in a Season.

Charles Buchan went on to say in his Autobiography "There are many who believe Arsenal sat back and allowed Dean to get the three goals that broke the record. I can assure you that nothing is further from the truth."

Buchan received £432 for accrued share of benefit for three years at Arsenal. The Club did not have to pay it and Buchan thought it was a generous gesture on behalf of the Club.

Dean of course went on scoring goals, 37 hat tricks alone for Everton, he is still remembered on Merseyside and was Voted The Greatest All Time Merseysider in 2007. This year Merseyside sees the Capital Of Culture honour bestowed upon the City and Everton Fans from The Everton Shareholders Association have made sure that Dixie Dean's name will be at the forefront of the celebrations over this weekend as they present The Dixie Dean Story a Theatrical Play all about the Great Man.



Magic in the Cup

There is no doubt about it, the F.A. Cup Final is THE big one, the bonanza, and the most spectacular, important

event in the British sporting calendar.

Some plump for the Derby or the National. Some Northern cricket fans, in the days of real bumper attendances at Old Trafford and Headingley, used to claim there was nothing to touch a Roses battle between Lancashire and Yorkshire. A Rugby Union international at 'Twickers.' The Boat Race. Seeing England v. West Germany. Seeing a European Cup Final; a full-blooded, on-and-off-the-field Celtic v. Rangers battle; or, for that matter, an Everton-Liverpool duel at Anfield or Goodison.

There is, as I have emphasised earlier, a tremendous honour in pulling on a white England football shirt and playing for your country. There is that pulsating feeling of pride in yourself and your team; your urgency and keenness to play even above yourself, so that you don't let down those with so much faith in you.

Yet, for sheer nerve-tingling excitement, for players and crowd alike, there's absolutely nothing to beat the Cup

Final at Wembley.

The build-up is best described in one word - fantastic! There has been that sudden death for so many clubs. They could have been the pick of the pops in the betting. But they could die on the operating table of any round that eventually leads you to that magic goal - Wembley.

The atmosphere of a Wembley Final, as I experienced it against Sheffield Wednesday in '66, has something that no other soccer game can boast. And, of course, I had that little extra bit of happiness at the end of that duel in the sun! I was skipper of the winning team . . . a side that had come back so brilliantly and with so much purpose, after being two goals down . . . an outfit which had helped to make it one of the most entertaining, thrill-packed and skilful Finals since 1953.

Some of Everton's promising youngsters – like the already established Joe Royle and up-and-coming Alan Whittle – will no doubt taste, in the not so distant future,

the sweetness of victory at Wembley.

Looking back, I think that the merry month of May, 1966, provided me with my most glorious moments in a football career that has been thoroughly enjoyable at club and international level.

I have earned, as I have stated previously, a sound salary for a number of seasons. I haven't pulled down quite the same amount of brass as certain other players, who have experienced the big-time with more than one top-class club. But I have no grumbles; none at all.

For I have been associated with only one club – the best in the land in my view, and the one which has at all times treated me fairly, also with the consideration any true professional should expect and receive in this money-spinner of Division I football.

Now, as I write my story, we are in the semi-final of the F.A. Cup for the second successive year since our Wembley triumph in '66. And, particularly down Everton way, we reckon that's pretty good going.

There have been, of course, other memorable occasions in my career. They stick out like a goal-post. Let's have a look at just one of them before we return to the magic

of the Cup, and Everton's Wembley Final win of 1966...

One of the most notable occasions, naturally, was my debut for Everton, which I have mentioned briefly elsewhere, and it remains as clear in my mind as if it

happened only yesterday.

Chief interest, I suppose, for the small, loyal band of Everton supporters who went to Birmingham City's St Andrews ground was centred in my first run-out with the senior side.

I had a touch of pre-match nerves. I was in pretty illustrious company. Yet I was only just eighteen, and less than a year earlier I had had no greater experience than grammar school football. I received some encouraging pats on the shoulder from the older fellows as we trotted out, wearing black armbands in memory of Mr T. C. Nuttall, Everton's vice-chairman, who had died earlier in the week.

Well, I didn't have an easy baptism in senior football, and I found the pace of Birmingham centre-forward Eddie Brown a bit more than I could cope with at times. I don't remember ever getting ruffled, however, which must have been one thing in my favour. Also, one of the tackles I managed to pull off was as perfectly-timed as anything I've done since. Brown, who could turn on a really nice burst of speed, was in full cry for goal. I got to him just in time. I can still see that look of surprise on his face as I stopped him in his tracks and hooked the ball into safety.

One soccer critic described the match – and Birmingham won by two goals to one – as follows: 'Birmingham completed their first double of the season, but judged by any standard of football skill, the game was a poor affair.

'If it had not improved after thirty minutes, spectators would have been well justified in asking for their money

back. For during that first half-hour play was as ragged

and scrappy as any seen this season.

'After only seven minutes, for instance, Birmingham inside-right Larkin, completely missed the ball when well-placed. There was one redeeming feature for Everton – the performance of 18-year-old Brian Labone, making his debut at centre-half.

'Eddie Brown has a reputation for dash and spirit, but his was a muted display, so well did Labone police him.

'Play began to pick up when both teams started to swing the ball about. At least there was plenty of movement! Once, when Brown eluded Labone, he smashed a class teams shot most Danlet.

close-range shot past Dunlop.

Birmingham's goals came in the last ten minutes of the first half. In the 35th minute outside-left Harry Hooper took a return pass, following a free-kick, and ran the ball right up before beating Dunlop. Six minutes later, right-winger Astall made use of a long throw-in, and Hooper, in the middle, hooked the ball into the net.

'The second half was much more interesting, but still lacking in accuracy, in passing, and good ideas. Yet Thomas's goal for Everton (60 mins.) was a good one -

headed in from a well-placed centre by Harris.

'Everton had only themselves to blame for not sharing the points. Outside-left Williams missed an absolute sitter. Everton were only a shadow of the fine combination seen against Villa earlier in the season. Labone had a good debut, and was not helped by Brown's unorthodox tactics.'

Well, as stand-in in my debut for centre-half Tommy Jones, I hadn't picked up a winning bonus in my first League game for Everton. But I didn't feel I had let them down either. And, what is equally important, I returned home much richer in experience for this first taste of First Division fare.

But even a butterflies-in-the-stomach, starry-eyed

debut, or your first international in the white colours of England, or even a championship-clinching game, don't measure up to a Cup Final at wonderful Wembley. Which takes me back two years ... to a day when, as the Merseyside Marvels, we got up from the floor and knocked Sheffield Wednesday for THREE ... to the moment I was handed that trophy after a Battle of the Roses that will go into soccer record books as 'a real good 'un.'

Now is the moment to give special praise to three players who are no longer with us at Goodison – Derek Temple, who moved on to Preston N.E. for a fee of about £30,000 in September, 1967; Mike Trebilcock, transferred to Portsmouth in January, 1968, for £40,000; and, finally, the irrepressible Jimmy Gabriel, now with

Southampton.

They proved to be a Terrible Trio – and much too hot to handle – for Alan Brown's Wednesday whirlwinds, so much over the moon at being two goals up, so much

crushed once we turned on the heat.

They did a remarkable job in the final carve-up of this Pride of Yorkshire side. I told myself at the end, as I walked up to the Royal Box to collect that big, gleaming, silver trophy: 'If they never do anything else for Everton, well, they have done enough for me today to earn my grateful thanks for life.'

It was Temple who finished off Wednesday once our champagne brand of football had begun to flow freely in a game punctuated, as so often happens at Wembley, with

high drama, explosions, joy and heartbreak.

It was Temple, in a flash, who scored a golden goal in the 73rd minute that had us whooping for joy, intoxicated our own supporters with a grand-slam finale, and had me nodding my head in amazement with the way he executed it.

Gerry Young, that solid anchorman of Wednesday, had a lapse he will never forget. It was incredible that he should fail to trap a simple ball. He had all the time in the world. And yet, in no apparent danger, he permitted the ball to bounce under his foot into a wide open space.

Temple was on him. Then he was away up the middle. He took the ball just as near to the goal as he needed to. Then he stabbed it past the outcoming, crouching

Springett. What a glorious goal!

Now there's Trebilcock, the young Cornishman who burst like a bomb on Merseyside soccer. Mike played more than a hero's part in our Wembley victory. His two goals brought us from two-down to 2-2. Moreover, he missed the opportunity of making history by failing to notch a hat-trick when well placed.

Less than five months after moving to Goodison from Plymouth – at a fee of slightly more than £,20,000 – Trebilcock was pushed into our Cup Final side in

preference to £,80,000 Fred Pickering.

Now I know Fred was disappointed. Wouldn't you be? He considered he was fully fit and that he ought to have been chosen. But Wembley is a tiring pitch. There's no point whatsoever in taking the slightest of chances. Pickering was out. And Trebilcock was given his big chanceles of trabot we told danons anob avad yads, lisw

He snatched at it like a baby ready for his bottle well past feed-time. In fact, he grabbed at it with both hands and both feet. He was an absolute wow.

He scored two of the three goals that gave us the Cup, and he said later: 'That is a memory they will never be able to take away from me.'

If he never realises another soccer dream, young Trebilcock certainly saw a couple come true before he left us for 'Pompey'.

He had started his soccer career playing junior stuff in

The Brian Labone Story



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The David France Collection

As the Granddaughter of Ralph 'Dixie' Dean, Melanie Prentice grew up surrounded by football treasures accumulated by the Everton legend during a playing career that brought him two League championships and an FA Cup triumph. But nothing had prepared her for the array of artefacts awaiting her arrival at Dr David France's home in Victoria, British Columbia. "We were bewildered by the original artwork of Picasso, Magritte, Dali, Chagall, Warhol, Miro and others," she recalls. "It was an overwhelming sight but a mere distraction because before our eyes lay a priceless exhibition of the masterpieces of football's history. I can only draw comparison with Howard Carter as he opened the door to Tutankhamen's tomb. While there were no gilded mummies or papyrus scrolls, there were simply too many sacred football items to comprehend..."

Programmes dating back to 1886, ancient medals and photographs, books and international caps, documents and letters, cigarette cards and trading cards... Dr France's collection of football memorabilia attracted two bids of £1.25 million from the Middle and Far East in 2006, instead of which it will go on display when the new Museum of Liverpool opens in 2010, having been purchased by the Everton Collection Charitable Trust for a fraction of what the 10,000 or so items would have commanded at auction.

Born in a two-up, two-down in Widnes with one cold tap, one electric light, one outside toilet and one nail holding up a zinc bath, Dr France was dismissed as a 'slow learner' as a schoolboy and was unable to read until the age of 14. Having begun his working life as an apprentice gas-fitter riding the streets on a bike with coils of copper pipe over his shoulders, he resumed his education and gained several university degrees, including a PhD in chemical engineering. He subsequently won the Institute of Physics' Joule Medal for his research into hydrogen combustion, served as a consultant to NASA in rocket science (his Green Card having been sponsored by Senator Edward Kennedy) and ended his working life at the age of 42 in 1990 to concentrate on 'good deeds'.

As well as combing the world for Everton jewels for the past 25 years, he has flown more than two million miles from his homes in Canada and Washington state to attend games, published 16 books (the latest, The Golden Vision, about 1960s centre-forward Alex Young) to raise money for Alder Hey Children's Hospital, established the club's Hall of Fame and founded the Everton Former

Players' Foundation, a charity to assist old Evertonians who have fallen on hard times and which Uefa use as their template for all such associations.

Former England international Gordon West, who won two championships and an FA Cup winner's medal during his nine years as Everton goalkeeper, heads a long list of heroes whose lives have been transformed by Dr France. "It was Brian Labone - who tragically died two years ago - who knew I collected bits and bobs (one particular cardboard box of 'bits and bobs' costing £78,000) who told me Gordon was struggling and might want to sell his medals," Dr France said. "He had ballooned to about 26 stone, didn't like to be seen in public so didn't attend any games and was so financially strapped that he had no laces in his shoes. Gordon's a lovely, lovely man but he was in trouble with the loan sharks and they are not lovely men.

He'd borrowed £1,000 but owed £4,500 so I rang the money men and they came round, three of them like something out of Reservoir Dogs complete with the Liverpool shuffle. They had Gordon's medals - which he'd given as collateral - in a plastic bag which they tossed on the floor with a sneer. After Gordon had seen them to the door he said, 'You've changed my life, I can live again now'.

"I never haggle over the price. I pay people exactly what the item or items would fetch at Christie's or Sotheby's so I left Gordon with his debt paid and a few quid in the bank. I also decided to do something to help all the Everton players - not only greats like Gordon West but the unsung guys - who need a helping hand in some way."

And so began the Everton Former Players' Foundation, which has moved on from paying off loan sharks to funding hospice care and vital operations. Such as the one undergone by Gordon Watson, who played for Everton alongside Tommy Lawton in the late 1930s.

Dr France said: "He then served as coach to Colin Harvey, Howard Kendall and Alan Ball, he brought Joe Royle along, was still working as a Goodison barman when he finally retired after working for the club for 60 years. When he retired they gave him a clock and two tickets for the next match right in the back row.

When I first met Gordon at one of our Hall of Fame dinners he was in a wheel-chair and had to be carried into the hotel by big Dave Watson. When he took the microphone Gordon captivated everyone with his tales of the old days and Dixie Dean. At the end of his speech he vowed, 'And this time next year I'm going to walk in here'. And one year later - watched by a slimmed down Gordon West in his new suit - Gordon Watson did just that after we'd arranged for him to have operations on his knees and hip. Two weeks later he passed away quietly without any fuss, but he'd kept his pledge."

Now the city of Liverpool will reap the benefits of Dr France's magnificent obsession with all things Everton. "We were a very poor family so not surprisingly we had few belongings," Dr France said. "My world changed and my royal blue indoctrination process started in 1953 after my folks arranged to have Rediffusion radio piped into our home. As a result, my first recollection of Everton was listening for the outcome of the FA Cup tie against Manchester United. I can close my eyes and still hear the cheers that reverberated along the distressed terraced brickwork lining Gerrard Street when the radio proclaimed that Dave Hickson had scored. Later that evening a neighbour presented me with the programme. Despite its folds and Bovril stain, it immediately became my most prized possession.

"Soon afterwards, however, I was stricken with scarlet fever and quarantined for a couple of months. Most things in the house were taken away and incinerated, including my one and only programme. However, upon my discharge from the misery of St Helens Isolation Hospital, my kind neighbour presented me with a replacement copy - in mint condition. That was the start..." Half a century and more on, Dr France's programme collection numbers 6,000-plus and represents a social history of Britain through the decades.

Return with me to Perry Barr on Sept 10, 1892, when Everton were the guests of Aston Villa and Lewis's were advertising "Gentlemen's blue beaver overcoats with velvet collars - 25/- [£1.25]", or to the Manor Ground, Plumstead on Nov 16, 1912, when Woolwich Arsenal were entertaining the Toffees and J Turnbull of 14 Plumstead Road was offering "the largest stock of boxing gloves and pocket lamps".

Is there a special jewel in Dr France's collection? "The most widely acclaimed outside of Merseyside is the earliest programme - April 15, 1889 - involving Newton Heath before they became Manchester United. After details of my great find had been featured in a collectors' magazine, I received an avalanche of responses. One offer from Kobe in Japan came with a string of zeroes while another proposal from Bournemouth wanted to clone copies for worldwide sale to Red Devils fanatics. It took me less than a nano-second to decline both offers."

SEPT 22, the everton have been most unfortunate this season in having player injured. In the game against west bromwich albion at the hawthorns harland the goalkeeper, was hurt, and has not played since, and yesterday at birmingham kendall who has kept goal so well of late had to retire with a damaged kneecap, as at west bromwich albion, o'donnell the full back went in goal, but everton suffred by 3 goals to 1. In the first game between the clubs at goodison park recently, everton had medonald injured and he has been out of the side, while at manchester on Saturday both brown and dean were damaged. Irvine and medain are other first team players who have been on the injured list already this season

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SEPT 26, everton have signed on an amateur form, the clever old xaverians goalkeeper j morris. He kept goal for his school team and was captain of the college side last tyear:- twenty-one year of age, and standing 6 feet 1 inches, he is engaged in the veterinary department of the university.

OCT 15, we understand the officials of everton have recently been on the look-out for new players with a view to adding to the strenghth of the side, but first class players are not easily obtainable these days it should not be forgotten that everton have had two goalkeepers injured

this season (kendall and harland both being damaged) in addition to hald a dozen other players, we have received numerous suggesions from amateurs teams bulders, but believe the officals of the club may be relied upon to strengthen what have been weak spots in the side, and there may be some intersting news for the goodison park club's supporters before long. Encouragement rather than criticism is what everton require just now.
